I am advised by Rev. Father Beys of the Oblate
Fathers that he has chosen as a suitable site for an Indian
School certain lands near McIntosh, Ontario, comprising 320
acres more or less, and being known as Locations L.K. 174 and
175 Canyon Lake.

I am acting for Mrs. Margaret Wilson of this city, who is interested in the property. The property was surveyed for her late husband James A. Wilson the intention being that for her late husband James A. Wilson the intention being that one-quarter section would be occupied by Mr. Wilson and the one-quarter by his son William Wilson. Some improvements other quarter by his son William Wilson. Some improvements were made on the property but the son went away to the war, and were made on the property but the son went away to the war, and was killed at the front. Mr. Wilson Snr. was killed accidentally on the C.N.R. in the early part of 1918. Owing to these happenon the C.N.R. in the early part of 1918. Owing to these happenoness Mrs. Wilson was unable to go into occupation of the property.

Mrs. Wilson is prepared to release all claim to the property upon payment of \$775.00. Out of this amount she would pay the price of the land asked by the Ontario Government, pay the price of the land asked by the Ontario Government, namely \$1.00 per acre. There are also expenses of surveying namely \$1.00 per acre. These would also be paid from the said which are still unpaid. These would also be paid from the said amount. As Mrs. Wilson's solicitor I would undertake to obtain amount. As Mrs. Wilson's solicitor I would undertake to obtain from her a Quit Claim Deed or such other documents as may be necessary to release her claim, and would also undertake to see that the said accounts are paid before handing any balance over to Mrs. Wilson.

I may say that in 1918 I had certain correspondence with the Department of Lands, Forests & Mines at Toronto with a view to obtaining title to the properties for Mrs. Wilson without the necessity of performing the usual homestead duties. The consent did not agree to this but they stated that they would be consent to Mrs. Wilson disposing of her interest in the land to consent to Mrs. Wilson disposing of her interest in the land to any other party who would undertake to do the settlement duties. I presume therefore that there would be no difficulty in arranging the matter satisfactorily.

Dear Mr. Phelan:

I have your letter of the 10th instant regarding the request made by Reverend Father J. Brachet, Principal of the McIntosh Indian Residential School, for a small boat.

I quite understand that your Department has spent a large amount of money for the construction of the road from the school to the station of McIntosh and that it is also yearly spending a fairly large sum for its maintenance.

But there is a problem of recruitment which must not be forgotten at McIntosh. All the reserves that send students to this school are north of it and there are no roads of any kind which can be used. For recruiting purposes a boat is therefore essential.

So that the Department would not be put to too much expense, I forwarded to Father Brachet the letter that I received from the Peterborough Canoe Co., and told him to select the cheapest boat capable of doing his recruitment. Personally, I would have advised him a much more expensive one, but he chose a 15 ft. boat without a canopy and powerone, but he chose a 15 ft. boat without a canopy and powered with an out-board motor. That is possibly, the cheapest boat that you ever purchased for a residential school. I therefore hope that you may want to reconsider your decision.
