Dear Mr. Ferrier:-

During my recent visit to our Society's school at Moose Fort the Principal drew my attention to the advisability of having the following pupils at this institution removed either to the Chapleau School or to the new School about to be opened at Sioux Lookout.

- (a) Gilbert Faries, admitted August 28.1921 born March 26.1916. Registered No 4.
- (b) Daisy Faries, admitted April 4.1925, born May 18.1918. Registered No. 018.
- (c) Roderick McDonald, admitted July 2.1922, born Nov. 25.1915, Registered No. 8.

The Mother of Gilbert and Daisy Faries, the Principal informs me, is a very immoral woman, having at least four illegitimate children, but she expressed the desire the last time the Principal saw her, that these two children should be moved to either one or the other of the above institutions.

With regard to Roderick McDonald, the teacher at our Moose Fort School, Mr Waller, is strongly of the opinion that he will develop into a splendid man and may bring great credit to his race if offered better educational facilities than Moose Fort possesses.

Both he and the Principal were strongly of the opinion that all the three above children should be moved to one of the larger schools and I now write to recommend that they be transferred to the new school at Sioux Lookout. As Canon and Mrs Griffin will be leaving Moose Fort early in August and proceeding first to Saskatoon on furlow before going to Ireland they would be able to escort these children



All the way to Sioux Lookout where they would be received by the new Principal, the Rev. J. F. J. Marshall, who will be in residence from the 1st of July.

As the cost of transferring these children would be borne by our Society, provided your Department continues to pay the per capita grant during the period they are en route, I trust that their transfer may be sanctioned.

On February 17th, 1928, Maggie Rickard, aged 13 last July Number 027 was given a bunch of keys by the Matron to unlock a door in the next room, which she did but also ran up to the dormitory and unlocked the door that separates the girls dormitory from the boys'. The Matron found the door unlocked shortly after the girls had gone to bed. Maggie denied that she unlocked it. She denied again the next morning until other girls were called then she admitted that she unlocked the door intending after the girls had gone to sleep to go into the boys' room. To avoid misunderstanding I asked the father and mother with Rev. Mr. Mark as interpreter to come and see and hear for themselves. The mother came alone and after seeing the place and hearing the confession she took her daughter home without my permission, although I assured her as far as I knew the Indian Department would advise dismissal of the girl. At present there is no magistrate and no policeman in the place. Owing to mail service I have not been able to write before.

I am now writing for advice regarding Maggie. I would recommend her dismissal, but something should be done to prevent the parents taking their children from the school without permission. I am informed it has been a common practice in the past.

I might say regarding Maggie Rickard that she was admitted to school last June, that she was always a dull and indolent girl.

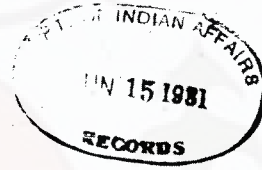

Dear Sir:-

The following is an extract from a letter written on May 30th. 1931 by the Rev. P. A. Northam, our Church's missionary at St. Paul's Mission, Albany, James Bay, to the Rev. J. Blackburn, Principal of our Moose Factory School, and just received here:-

"The Revillon Power boat and two scows leave here next week for Moose. I am seizing the opportunity to send over to Moose three or perhaps four children. It is an emergency case. One of our families here had a very unfortunate time. The mother and three big boys died and the father and the remaining five children were found in a starving condition by the man's brother. The woman had been dead nearly a month and the boys for a couple of weeks. The bodies were unburied as the survivors had little strength to do anything. As soon as the news was brought in here food was sent out to them, and arrangements were made to get them in by canoe as soon as a canoe could be taken along the coast. The children have picked up wonderfully, but the father is in poor shape. He will be unable to look after his little girls and a boy of about seven. The oldest girl is about 12 years. I do not know if you have any vacancies in the school, but I feel sure that, in a case of emergency, you will do your best and accommodate them in some way until such times as you are likely to have older children leaving the School. You may rest content that this is a real case for special effort otherwise I would not be sending them to you without first having made arrangements to do so with you."

In view of the painfully distressing circumstances set forth in this communication, I do not see that Mr. Northam could have taken any other action than the one, nor do I see that the Principal of our Moose Factory School can do otherwise than receive the children mentioned when they arrive, and admit them to our school as grant-earning pupils. The Principal states that clothing will be required at once for these children, and requests authority to buy it locally. This authority is being granted, with a request that the account be kept separate, and forwarded to me for submission to your Department. I shall be obliged, therefore, if you will approve the admission of these children to our school, and meet the cost of clothing and transportation when the accounts are submitted.


Reverend Sir,-

I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 11th instant, with reference to three or four children whom it has been found necessary to send to the Moose Fort Indian Residential School.

In reply I beg to say that, in view of the circumstances, their admission is approved and grant will be allowed for them. When forwarding his June quarter return, the Principal should give full information regarding these children on the admission and discharge form which accompanies the return.

It is noted that it was found necessary to purchase some clothing for them and, as it is presumed that only the clothing absolutely required was secured, payment for same will be made upon receipt from you of a properly certified account, in duplicate.

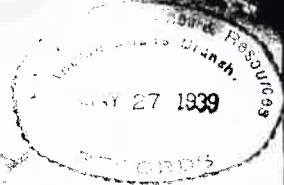

Dear Mr. Hoey:-

You will note from the following extract from a letter just received from the Rev. Gilbert Thompson, B.A., Principal of our Moose Factory School, that he desires some definite ruling with regard to circumstances under which Indian parents may have their children removed from a school into which they have, ^{been} admitted, and where they are expected to remain until they have attained the age limit for their discharge.

Mr. Thompson's letter was dated Moose Factory, Jan. 24th, and reads in part as follows:-

"In this area parents apparently think they can take out their children whenever they please. The most recent instance occurred this week when the wife of Thomas Nickoshi asked for her children out of the school. She gave as her reason that since her husband had joined the army she needed the children home to help look after the smaller children while she helped her 16 yr. old boy to get wood. The two whom she wanted are girls, 12 yrs. and 14 yrs. respectively. I am fairly well convinced that the reason she gave was not the real one. I had a little trouble with the younger of the two girls and told her that if she could not behave better I would not let her stay in school. She went home and told her mother what I had said and her mother told her she would take her out of school. Before the mother came to see me she went to see the Agent telling him that she needed the girls home to help her and he said as far as he was concerned it would be alright for her to take them out, but that she had better come and see

"ms. I have let the children go since I could not see that I could do otherwise. Hence my reason for asking if there is any ruling on the matter. If there isn't would it be possible to obtain one from the Dept.?"

I happen to know Thomas Nickoshi and his wife, Clara, quite well. I also remember that, before our new and larger school was built at Moose Factory, some of their children were being educated in our Chapleau School. When the new school was ready at Moose Factory the two children that were at Chapleau were transferred to the Moose Factory School, and I learned from Mr. Thompson that these are the very children that the mother is now insisting on having at home with her. Mr. Thompson's statement that he is fairly well convinced the reason given by Mrs. Nickoshi for wanting the children home was not the real one seems to me to indicate that we would be justified in asking that the case be very carefully reconsidered by the Indian Agent, and an order given for the children to be returned to the school, should it be found that they were allowed to leave for reasons which are not in accordance with the facts.

Dear Doctor Westgate:

I am in receipt of your letter of the 3rd instant with reference to the communication you have received from the Principal of the Moose Fort Indian Residential School. I am forwarding a copy of your letter to the Indian Agent and asking him for a report. On receipt of his reply you will be further advised.

In the meantime I may say that it has always been definitely understood that when a child is admitted to an Indian residential school such child should remain there until formally discharged by the Department. Such discharge is usually recommended either by the Principal or the Indian Agent and I believe, in most cases at least, both these officials concur before applying for discharges. With this in mind I am at a loss to understand why Mr. Thompson allowed the children to leave the school without making application to the Department.

I have noted the contents of your letter and that of Dr. Westgate, which you attached.

Mr. Thompson's comments were rather a surprise to me, as he remarks that apparently parents in this area think they can take out their children whenever they please. This is the first instance to my knowledge where I have, in mutual agreement with Mr. Thompson, sanctioned the removal of children from residence - although the R.C.M. Police and myself have been approached on other occasions to interfere.

Mrs. Nickoshi came to ^{us} complaining of treatment her children received at the school and demanded that they be allowed to go home and stay with her - also giving as an excuse that she needed the children to help her since her husband had joined the army. As the woman was quite hard to handle, I went to Mr. Thompson and discussed the matter with him and it seemed best to both of us to avoid further trouble by allowing the children to go out, provided they attended Day School. Mr. Thompson made the remark that he was not at all anxious for the children to return to Residential School, as he anticipated that if this was done their Mother would continue to be a source of trouble.

In future any complaints will be discussed with Mr. Thompson and both sides of the matter referred to you for decision.

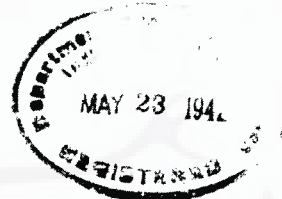

Dear Sir;

In view of the fact that I acknowledged your letter in which you asked that the services of the R. C. M.P. be not used unless absolutely necessary I, feel it my duty to report to you that I have had occasion to call upon the services of the local R. C. M.P.

On the evening of Nov. 20th., between 6.30 p.m. and 7.30 p.m. two boys left the school grounds. I began searching for the same shortly afterwards. By 10.00p.m I could not locate these boys and knowing that they might have crossed the river, which crossing was precarious in the dark due to the fact that parts of the river were not yet frozen, I notified Cpl. W. Kerr of the R. C. M. P. Together we made a further search that night. The following morning I went to Moosonee and discovered that it was possible the lads had slept in the deserted shack of the family of one lad. No one had seen the boys at Moosonee. That night the policeman and I went across to the shack in the hope that the lads would have returned there, but they were not there. The next morning the policeman took his dogs and went down the railroad track following up a lead that someone had seen two people walking on the track, who had later disappeared into the bush when sighting the on-coming man. The boys were well clothed, but not outfitted for severe weather. Before the policeman overtook them they had walked some 24 miles and had reached the camp of the parents of one of the boys. All returned the following Wed. night by train, including the parents of the one boy. (The ~~xxx~~ other boy comes from East Main and has no parents).

Sometime on Thur. the parents of the one boy went to see Dr. Orford, the local Indian Agent, when they asked to take the child out of school giving as their reason, as far as I ~~xxx~~ ascertained that day, that they were afraid the boy might run away again and get some other boy into serious trouble. The boys gave as their reason for running away that some of the boys teased them. They are 13yrs and 14yrs of age. On the Thur. afternoon the policeman came with the parents and said the Indian Agent, Dr. Orford, had given permission for the parents to take their boy, Mathew Chum, #110 out of school, but before doing so the father was to punish his boy in front of the other children. The boy left that afternoon.

In a letter to Dr. Westgate from Mr. Hoey, #44-6-10 relative to the discharge of pupils Mr. Hoey writes in part.

"In the meantime I may say that it has always been definitely understood that when a child is admitted to an Indian Residential School such child should remain there until formally discharged by the Department ~~xxx.~~ I am at a loss to understand why Mr. Thompson allowed the children to leave the school without making application to the Department."

In the instance of this boy being taken out of school you will readily see that I had no opportunity of 'making application to the Department.' I was simply told that the parents were to take the boy out and they waited for him.

The whole incident does not help us in trying to make the people realize that once they have put their children in school they should leave them there until they are 16 yrs of age. It will work the opposite. I anticipate other children leaving the school almost on any pretext and the possibility of the parents appearing to take their children out of school. Unless something definite is done about the matter I shall be at a loss to prevent them. I shall appreciate anything you might do to prevent such a situation.

1. At 9.15 P.M. of the 20th instant, Rev. G. Thompson of the Indian Residential School reported that two of the pupils were missing, Matthew Chum and Luke Tamituk.
2. After supper, the same evening, both the boys had requested permission to go to the lavatory outside the main building and had not returned after permission had been granted by the supervisor on duty. Matthew Chum had previously been guilty of truancy the preceding Spring. Both boys were just under 14 years of age.
3. Accompanied by Mr. Thompson I patrolled the Island and made inquiries among the local residents but to no avail as neither of the boys had been seen. All vacant houses were visited. Later we followed the trail to Mocoosnee across the Island and where the trail goes onto the river ice we found no marks of anyone going in that direction. The tide at that time was high and the border of water around the shore made it impossible to reach the solid ice. Another route to Mocoosnee was investigated but no tracks seen on it. The barns and outbuildings of the School had also been searched.
4. The next day it was learned that the boys had slept in a cabin at Mocoosnee the previous night (The cabin was one belonging to Matthew Chum's father who was on his winter trapline). Indians interviewed reported they had not seen the boys and that they were no tracks on the railway leading south. A further search of the Mocoosnee district was made but no trace of the missing boys was found. Later in the evening an Indian Trapper who had been walking along the railway south of Mocoosnee and who had just reached the village, reported that he had seen the persons along the track but they had run into the bush before he could identify them. They had been proceeding south. He also reported that the tracks had reached the railway from a creek bed some two miles from Mocoosnee which would account for the absence of tracks along the regular path south.
5. Both the boys had been dressed in rubber boots and cloth windbreakers, and although Indians were camped at 12 mile intervals along the tracks, it was feared that a sudden cold spell might have serious results to the boys if they were caught between camps or met with any injury. Neither boy was believed to have matches or axe.
6. The next morning I set out alone with 4 dogs and sled along the tracks leading south. I expected to find the boys at the first Indian Camp but on my arrival there I learned they had passed there the previous afternoon. I continued on and while camped in the bush some 20 miles from Mocoosnee that evening, I was visited by an Indian returning to his

6. - camp from his traps. He informed me that he had passed the boys the previous day and that they were headed for the camp of James Chum ~~Skow~~, father of Matthew. He stated that this camp was located off the tracks in the bush some 12 miles further on. I hired him as guide and set off within the hour and we travelled to midnight. The guide was a bit off in his computation of mileage and we camped with some Indians for the remainder of the night in the camp that the guide had thought was James Chum's. The next morning we set off again and around noon reached James Chum's camp where I found both truants, Matthew Chum and Luke Tamituk.

7. Both boys, on being questioned, stated that they had left school because the other boys had teased them and for no other reason. The father and Mother of Matthew Chum informed me that they had intended to return the boys to school on the weekly train and that the boys had given them the same reason as given me for leaving school.

8. As my 4 dogs were incapable of transporting the boys, guide and myself back to Moosonee through the prevalent deep snow and I had no camping equipment outside of an axe and canvas sheet, I decided to send the dogs back with the guide and return with the boys on the weekly train which could be flagged from the tracks.

9. I stayed at the camp until the following evening (24-11-43) and we flagged the train at 7.30 P.M. and arrived at Moosonee the same evening, where I returned the boys to the school.

10. The next day James Chum and his wife applied to the Indian Agent, Doctor T.J. Orford, to have their son released from school as they were worried he might get into trouble sometime by running away and injuring himself or other boys he might take with him. The Indian Agent gave them permission to take the boy back to camp with them, and released him from school.

11. Disciplinary action was taken by the Principal of the school on Luke Tamituk, and Matthew Chum was spanked before the assembled boy pupils at the school by his father.



Following an outbreak of typhoid fever among the Indian children attending the Bishop Herden Memorial Residential School, operated by The Church of England Mission, at Moose Factory, Ontario, the undersigned was requested by the Division of Indian Health Services to conduct a sanitary survey of the area and to assist the Medical Officer in determining, if possible, the cause of the outbreak and to recommend remedial measures in order to prevent a recurrence of such outbreaks.

Moose Factory Island is located in the estuary of the Moose River some twelve miles from James Bay and two miles south of Moosonee, the end of rail. The Island is roughly oval in shape and has an area of 1,133.3 acres. It is fairly level, about 22 feet in elevation above mean sea level and covered with second growth, spruce, poplar, birch and willow.

The settled and inhabited area of the Island is situated along the southwest side, the chief buildings comprising the Anglican School, small hospital, Anglican Church, R.C.M.P. Detachment, Hudson's Bay Company Trading Post, Roman Catholic Church and some seventy-six (76) Indian dwellings. The resident white population is thirty-six (36) in addition to three hundred and eighty-four (384) Indians, which are variable in number as they come and go.

Attention was first given to making a careful investigation of the water supply and sewerage systems of the Anglican Mission, followed by a survey of the general sanitary conditions prevailing on this Island. In this connection it is desired to point out that general matters of sanitation on the Island would properly come under the supervision of the Health Department of the Province of Ontario, in which it is located. The environmental conditions directly affecting the health and welfare of the Indians could be considered a Federal responsibility.

HISTORY OF TYPHOID FEVER EPIDEMIC

The story of the development and progress of the epidemic, as recounted by the Medical Officer, may be briefly stated as follows: In August and September, a Mr. Tinney, employed by the School, became ill and was hospitalized at Cochrane. On September 20th, a resident pupil, Peter -----, became ill followed later by one of the girls on September 29th. Three (3) more girls became ill on October 1st. A short time later, the Archdeacon and Superintendent of the School, Mr. G.H. Cook, was sent to hospital at South Porcupine, being diagnosed and later confirmed on October 6th as suffering from typhoid fever. The previous cases were also confirmed as typhoid.

On this date certain prophylactic measures were put into effect by the Medical Officer. All drinking water on the Island was ordered to be boiled and excreta from the known typhoid patients was disinfected and buried in disposal pits. Since that time one girl and two boys became ill with typhoid. No further cases have developed within the outside incubation period of thirty (30) days so that the preventive measures adopted have apparently been successful in stopping the progress of the epidemic.

In summary then, there are ten (10) patients hospitalized with typhoid, five (5) Indian girls, three (3) Indian boys, at the Mission, Mr. Tinney and Mr. Cook at other hospitals.

The Anglican Mission School has a staff of thirteen (13) with fifty-eight (58) resident pupils and twenty-five (25) day pupils. Following the outbreak of typhoid the day pupils were not allowed to attend school.

WATER SUPPLY SYSTEM - ANGLICAN MISSION

The school and ancillary building; at the end of the settlement. The source of water supply is pumped and delivered under pressure to outlets in the Superintendent's residence and the foreman's residence. The flow varies between seven-hundred (700) and two-thousand (2,000) gallons per hour.

The intake and pump house are located at the River bank, south of the school building. The intake is located in a cross-channel of the river, the suction pipe being 1 1/2" galvanized iron extending about 20 ft. and covered with 5 ft. of water at low tide. The thickness of ice during the winter varies from 3 to 4 ft. and there is usually some physical damage done to the pipe during the spring break-up.

The pumping equipment comprises an electrically operated (11 D.C.) reciprocating plunger pump with a rated capacity of approximately 2,000 gallons per hour. This is housed in a concrete pit on top of the river bank. The discharge line is a one-inch pipe which runs to a 120 gallon pressure tank in the school basement with taps and branches to the various buildings. The pump is automatic in operation and has a pressure range between 45 and 75 pounds per square inch.

In 1943 a hypochlorinator was ordered to provide treated water supply and was placed in operation early in 1944. The unit is a hydro-mechanical one, type HMM, manufactured by Wallace and Tiernan Company (complete). This feeds a chlorine solution into the discharge pipe from the pump when the pump is running by means of a solenoid valve on the distribution line from the pressure side of the tank. The hypochlorinator is situated ahead of the tank, which is regarded as satisfactory since it is provided for contact with the disinfecting solution.

However, a careful study of the actual operation of the system disclosed there are several inherent defects in the present system. The most serious defect is the fact that the water pressure line operates rather than being piped directly from the pressure side of the pump. It passes through a long loop of pipe, off which are taken all the distribution outlets, the connection to the chlorinator being at the end of the loop. When the pump was running and a tap was opened, it was noted that due to the drop in pressure occasioned by the opening of the tap, there was frequently not enough pressure available to operate the mechanism of the chlorinator. This means that when a tap is drawn off during the pumping period, unchlorinated water is drawn from the tank. As this condition prevails quite frequently, approximately 50% of the water pumped from the river to the storage tank is unchlorinated.

At the writer's suggestion, the scheme for a direct pipe connection from the pressure tank directly to the distribution system to ensure more positive action. In this connection it is suggested that an electrically operated hypochlorinator provided with automatic control be installed.

Further to my long explanatory letter of January 12th., 1950, I have to report that late in January I received readings from Dr. Simpson of the Division of TB Prevention, Parliament Buildings, Toronto on certain of these children as follows:

- " " Daniel Atsynia show this as a very poor film and very difficult to interpret. No definite evidence of Pulmonary Tuberculosis. A Tuerculin test should be done and if possible film repeated.
- " " Clifford Shashaweskum show this film is of such poor technical quality and so poorly positioned that a definite reading cannot be made. No evidence of Pulmonary TB. Recommend that this film be repeated, a tuberculin test done and further report made.

Due to my absence from my office on various occasions and to the rush of other work I realize I have been tardy in getting these reports to you,

Referring to my discussion with Mr. J. Long to have the other X-rays done on an early date, he advised that due to the unusual amount of work he had to do as Acting Principal and to faulty plumbing which prevented him from the proper preparation of his developing and fixing fluids he was long delayed in getting these other children x-rayed. This has been done only recently and the films are being sent to Toronto for a reading on the other six children who are on your list of twenty-one, viz: Clara Jolley, Beatrice Mark, George Stewart, George Couttit, Lucy Cutherland, Lazarus Wilpin.

I failed to note in my last letter that George Couttit was returned last summer from Sanatorium with recommendations that he be permitted to attend the school. My recommendation he be x-rayed was only routine.

A summary of the above shows that the findings of these children are not sufficient to dismiss them from the school for health reasons. However, I have further to report that recommendations were made to keep under careful observation the following.

This will be done. One of them are serious enough for dismissal.

I have to report that my nurses have done Tuberculin test on all the children living in at the school and only 32 were negative. I might say that this has been the usual finding on each of our annual examinations at this school.

My nurses are also continuing with the inoculations which will be completed in due course. We will then be able to fill in the forms sent by Agent Cariviere.

Dr. Simpson has been advised of the number of TB tests that are negative and I have recommended that these be given BCG vaccinations. I am awaiting a supply of the same and directions for such from there.

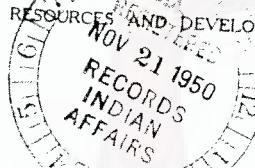

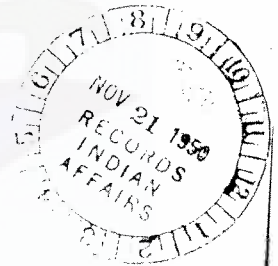
Dear Colonel Neary:

In February, 1949, a fifteen year old Eskimo boy, David Koomayuk, was flown by mercy plane from Creswell Bay on Boothia Peninsula to the Dr. Charles Camsell Memorial Hospital in Edmonton suffering the loss of both feet from gangrene. Since then he has been fitted with artificial limbs and is now able to move around quite freely. During his stay in hospital he has been taking advantage of the educational opportunities provided, and has learned to talk English fairly fluently already. He has received a considerable amount of publicity due to his rather extraordinary progress for he is considered particularly brilliant. He has started Grade 3 arithmetic and in his reading has almost completed his Grade 2 reader.

Unfortunately, a short time ago he ^{con}tracted a slight case of tuberculosis, but this has been cleared up and Dr. Falconer advises that the boy will be ready for discharge about January 1, 1951.



I am attaching herewith a copy of a letter I am sending to Dr. Moore. In this you will notice that the suggestion has been made that David should be placed at Moose Factory in order that he can attend the school there and also have the benefit of the medical service available at the hospital. Furthermore, he would be in the company of other Eskimo people and would possibly have the opportunity to work into a job that he could handle satisfactorily.
