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

The kitchen range is apparently quite old and in need of several repair parts. I suggested to the Principal that he list the parts needed and find out if they are available; and if so, the price. The wash sink leaks and consequently dirty water has got in around the stand which holds the tubs. The result is quite a sour smell. These tanks should be renewed.

The kitchen floor is cement and very hard on the feet. If Battleship linoleum is available the floor should be covered. The full size of the kitchen is 16' x - 25'. All should be covered, but if funds are not available, then the portion most essential measures 10' x 16'. This is between the kitchen range and the table where the staff member does most of the work. AA quality of linoleum should be supplied.

The boiler room was quite tidy and the equipment in fair condition. This boiler room is very cold and a lot of heat is lost even before it reaches the school. I would recommend that the roof of the room be sealed in with plaster board and gyprock insulation be used overhead. The doors-should be repaired and refitted. The above improvements will save many a cord of wood and I am sure the heating of the school will not be the problem it is today.

Schools:

During the quarter visits were made to both the McIntomh and Sioux Lookout Indian "esidential Schoo s. At McIntosh an attempt was made to have the children familiarize themselves with the outside pole-type fire escapes. The boys were unable to use the escape with any degree of confidence. However, the Reverend Principal Assured me he would see to it that they had plenty of me practice in future. I might add that under certain conditions in the winter months, the iron pole fire escapes are dangerous for the inexperienced.

At the Sioux Lookout School the poles are inside

the building. This arrangement permits the pupils to have more practise, although the efficiency of the arrangement is open to question. At the Sioux Lookout School twenty-two of the older pupils are enrolled in the Air Cadets. They are being trained by Miss Richardson, a staff member who was previously in the Women's Division of the R.C.A.F. These boys are all greatly interested in this movement. interested in this movement and look very smart in their uniforms.

At both esidential Schools in this Agency

lack of recreational and athletic opportunities is very noticeable. I believe that much more thought should be given to this phase of school life, as the Indian children seem to enjoy sports and games even more than out own children do. Under proper supervision this would go a long way toward defeloping character and physique.

During the interval between treaty payments, I took the opportunity to visit Pelican School, in company with Mr. Swartman. Generally the condition of the school was good, but attention should be drawn to two features which have in one case direct, and in the other indirect relation to the physical welfare of the pupils. Firstly, the boys' dormitory and to a lesser extent the girls' are overcrowded. In the former the beds are so close that they touch at the sides. This is bad, especially where the children are as susceptible to respiratory disease and tuberculosis as are Indians. It might be possible to put up quarters outside the school for the farm employees, who at present occupy an entire upper dormitory, freeing this space for pupils. Alternatively, double-decker beds, 18" to 2' apart, would be better from a droplet-infection standpoint. Until something permanent can be done, the pupils should sleep head to foot alternately. I do not wish to be over-critical, but from the standpoint of public health the designation of a couple of three-bed rooms in Indian schools as preventoria is a travesty; if the entire residential school is not a preventorium what are we spending our money for?

On Jan. 15th I visited the Sioux Lookout Indian residential school where a number of new pupils were examined for admission. Conditions in this school have improved when compared with last year. In carefully going over the children's weight it is noted that a gradual increase has occurred in almost every pupil since admission last September which would indicate that the diet is adequate in calories. I beg to recommend that an additional dormitory for help be erected at this school. I understand that the Rev. Principal has made application for this and it will do much to prevent over drowding as at present the help are sleeping in the school building.

None of the radiators are provided with valves. " Could it be arranged that an engineer from either the Surveys & Engineering Branch, Department of Mines and Resources, or the Department of Public Works who may be proceeding west in the near future stop off at Sioux Lookout and look over this plant with a view to determining the remedy required? Refrigeration Facilities, Anglican Residential School, Sioux Lookout, Ontario

Recently I have been drawing the attention of several of our Principals to the extremely une conomic practice of purchasing small quantities of meat at a time and in every case the reason given is lack of refrigeration facilities. I then asked for reports on the existing refrigeration facilities.

As regards Sioux Lookout, the Principal's report is as follows:

"Our refrigeration facilities are certainly not modern.
Outside there is an icehouse which probably stands on
poor foundations since it has settled on one side. Here
tis very difficult to keep a week's supply of fresh
it is very difficult to keep a week's supply of fresh
meat and fish in good condition during the summer months.
Inside the school, in the pantry, there is an oldfashioned icebox refrigerator, 5% ft. high by 4% ft.
wide by 27 ins. deep.

I rather think that Mr. Fisher requested from the Department as part of the 1947 appropriation for this school an ammonia refrigerating unit operated by 110 v. B.C. electing the locker would have to be big enough to tric plant. The locker would have to be big enough to hold up to about 400 lbs. meat, etc. There is room in the pantry for a good-sized Frigidaire or similar unit the pantry for a good-sized Frigidaire or similar unit capable of serving the domestic needs of a school of this capable of serving the domestic needs of a school of this capable. Perhaps I should add that the principal's residence has a smallish ice-box refrigerator which seems to be very imperfectly insulated.

I imagine that, if the various services we have requested already for this school (insulation of attic, overhaul

of heating system, provision of heaters) are carried out, allotment in this year's estimates for this school will be exhausted. Further, I presume that your Departmental Estimates for 1948-49 already are prepared and it is now too late to make special provision for any additional items in them. However, special provision for any additional items in them. However, I presume also that, following your normal practice, you have I presume also that, following your normal practice, you have made some provision in your 1948-49 Estimates for general serwices at each school, including Sioux Lookout, and perhaps this would cover the provision of adequate refrigeration facilities would cover the provision of adequate refrigeration facilities there next spring; if not, would you be good enough to keep this service in mind when you prepare your Supplementary Estimates for 1948-49?

The storage of meat, fish, etc., should present no problem at Sioux Lookout from now until the end of next winter but I would like to see more adequate refrigeration installed there before the warm weather sets in next year.

"In looking over the school I find that there was originally a room set aside for showers but the showers were never installed, Bathing 150 children in half a dozen bath tubs is rather a formidable job. I am told that at some of the residential schools the children slip on a simple cotton bathing suit (home made and cheap) and go into the shower room a dozen or more at one time. I would recommend that these showers be installed and that some such bathing routine be instituted."

Dear Doctor:

On September 28th I visited the Sioux Lookout Indian residential school and made a thorough inspection.

In general there has been a vast improvement under the present principal Rev. Wilson and I was very pleased indeed with the many changes he has made and with the present attitude of both staff and children. A great deal of painting has been done with brighter colors and the building is clean, which condition has not prevailed for several years. The children's body and clothes were clean and good discipline is maintained. I had the privilege of having dinner with them and there has been a great improvement in the way the food is prepared and served. I presume the Department dentist will visit the school this Fall as there is considerable work required. I feel that the Department should make an extra effort to alter a few discrepancies in their Department now that the school is being run competently and I would like to recommend the following:

- 1. The road to the school should be widened so that the snow plough could pass through and keep it open in the winter. At present the road is too narrow for a snow plough.
- 2. There is in wet weather a continuous seepage into the basement through the foundation. Often water is 1" or 2" deep and this constitutes a real hazard to the children's health not to mention the inconvenience of working in such a condition. I think most of this water comes from the roof and I would suggest that an eavestrough be placed around the entire building and the water from same be conducted away from the building.

- 3. The boys' lavatory requires considerable work. The room itself needs plastering. The present 3 tubs should be removed as the shower room is adequate. All of the boys' toilet bowls should be removed and replaced by new ones. The present scheme is very bad and cannot be rectified. There is leekage from the present concrete toilet block which creates an odor through the building and the situation in general is block which creates an odor through the building and the situation in general is unsanitary and a danger to the health of the children. This is inside work and can be done even after "freeze-up". I feel that the Department should undertake this work immediately.
- 4. There should be mechanical refrigeration supplied for the kitchen as the present one does not function and cannot be repaired. The large refrigerator is working well but the kitchen staff cannot go to the large refrigerator for small items as this would mean opening and closing the door of same incessantly and a low temperature could not be maintained. I would suggest that this new refrigerator be a kerosene could not be maintained. 

Recently while in Sioux Lookout I was informed that Indian Affairs was planning to recover the flooring in the two boys dormitories. I also noticed that not one of the beds was fitted with domes or casters.

Feeling that the new floor would hold up a very short time under use when beds have no casters or domes. I have twied to locate something suitable with which to equip the beds.
