Extract from a Report of the Committee of the Honourable the Privy Council, ordered by His Excellency on the 10th February 1900.

On a report dated 24th January 1900, from the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs, stating that the authorities of the Church of England have recently incurred considerable expense in connection with the Shingwauk Home, and industrial institution conducted by them at Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, in the interest of the Indians, and have applied to the Department for a contribution.

The Minister recommends, the institution being of very great benefit to the Indians in the vicinity, and as they have given nothing towards its support since 1895, that, under Section 70 of the Indian Act, as substituted by Section 6 of Chapter 34, Victoria 61, authority be given for a contribution of \$2,000 being made to the above mentioned institution from the funds of the bands concerned, in proportion to the amount of capital at the credit of each band and the number of children in attendance, as shown in the following statement:-

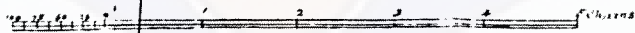

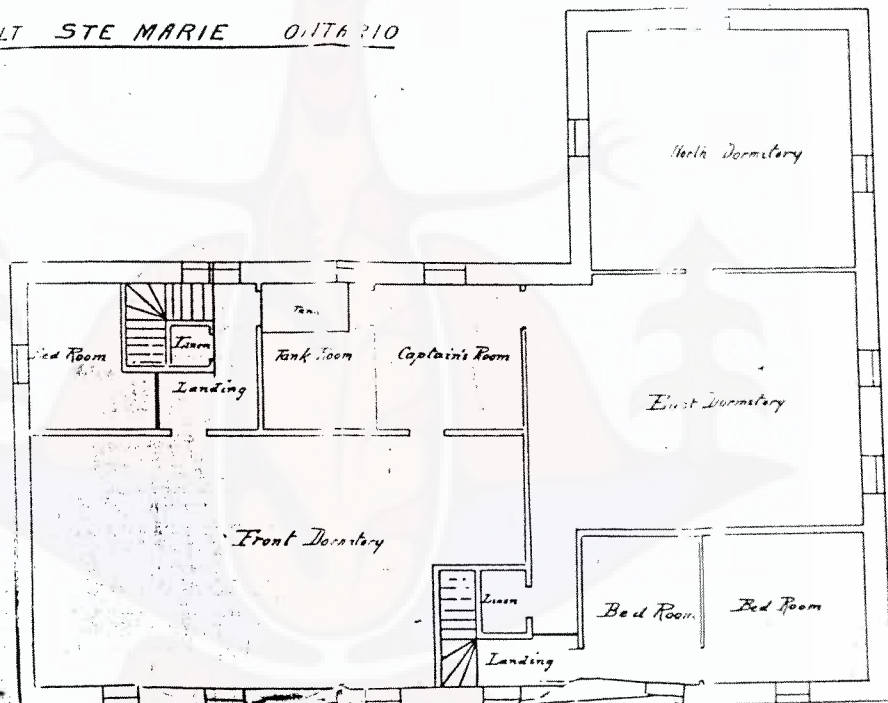

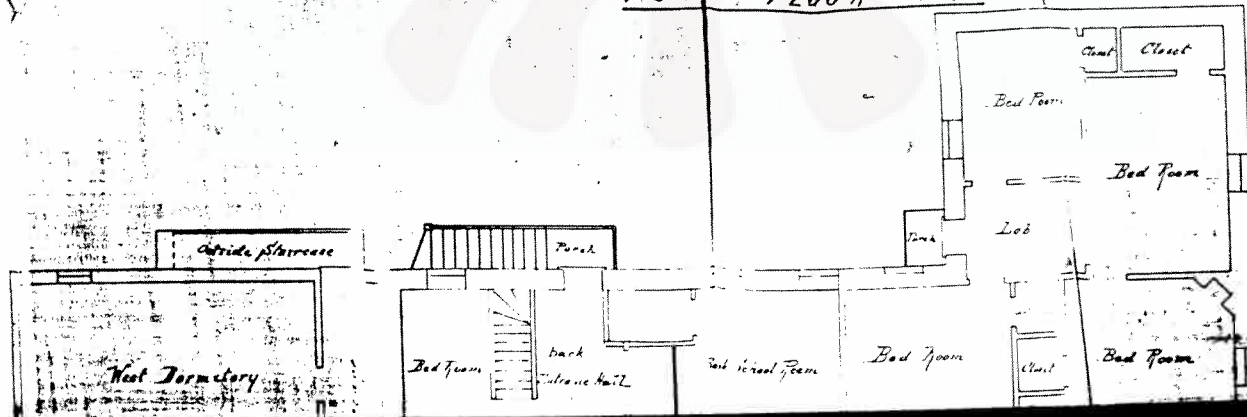

PLAN OF THE SHINGWAUK HOME

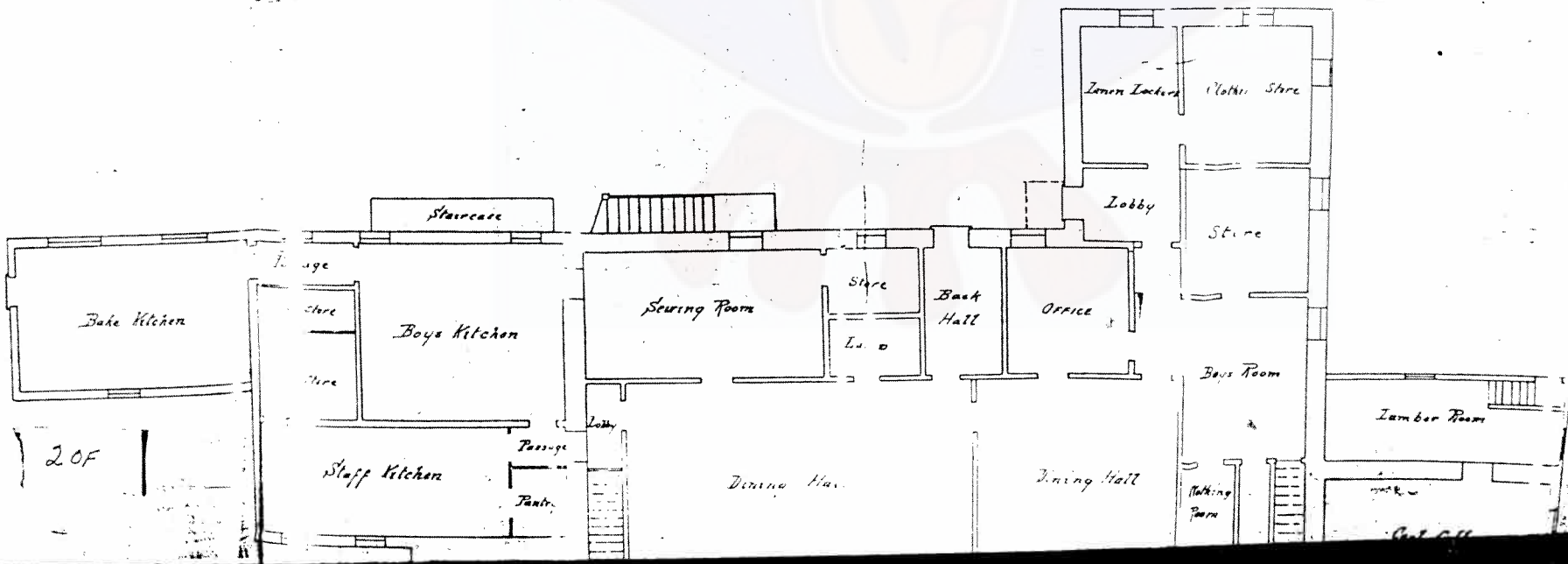
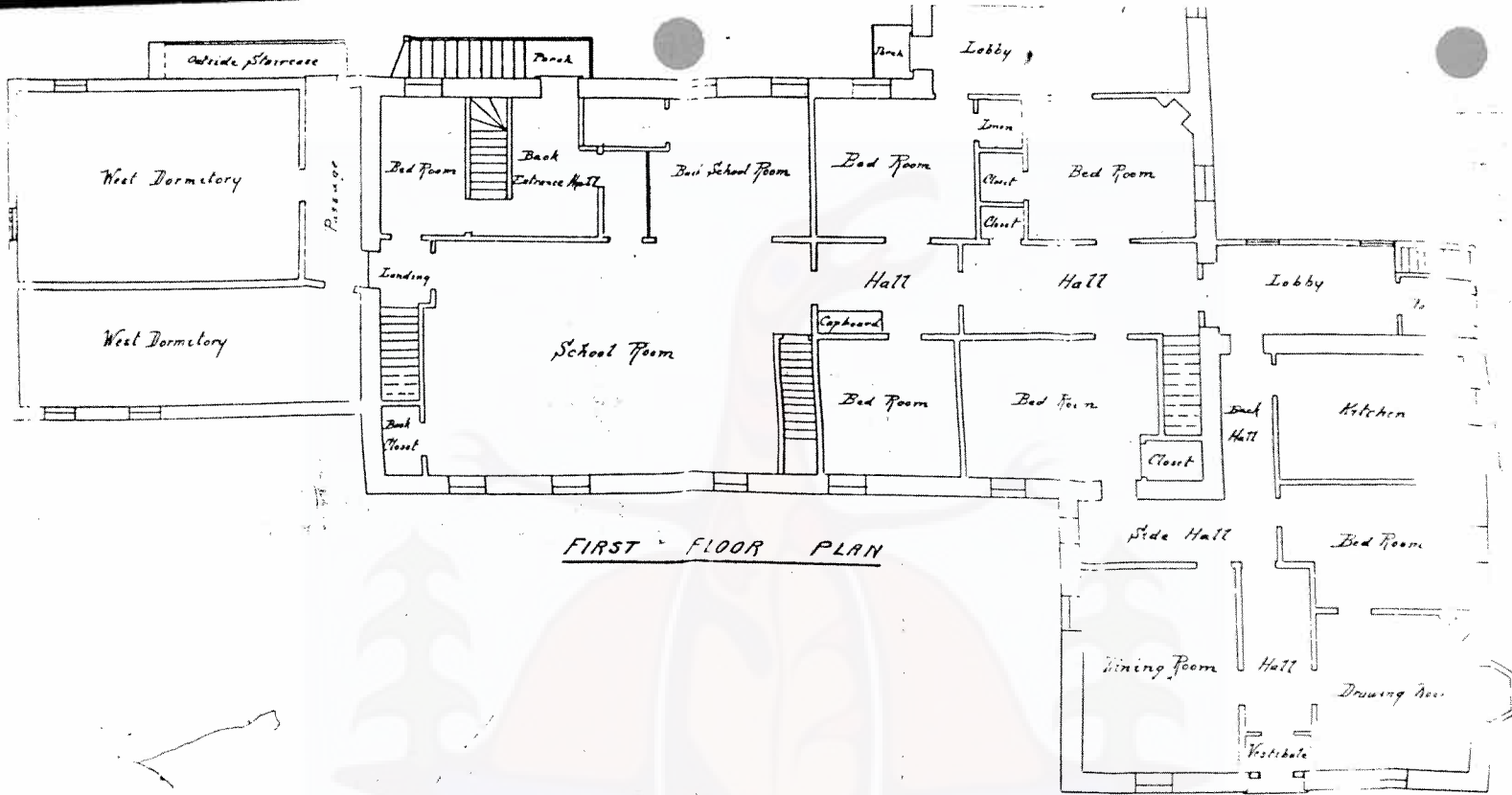

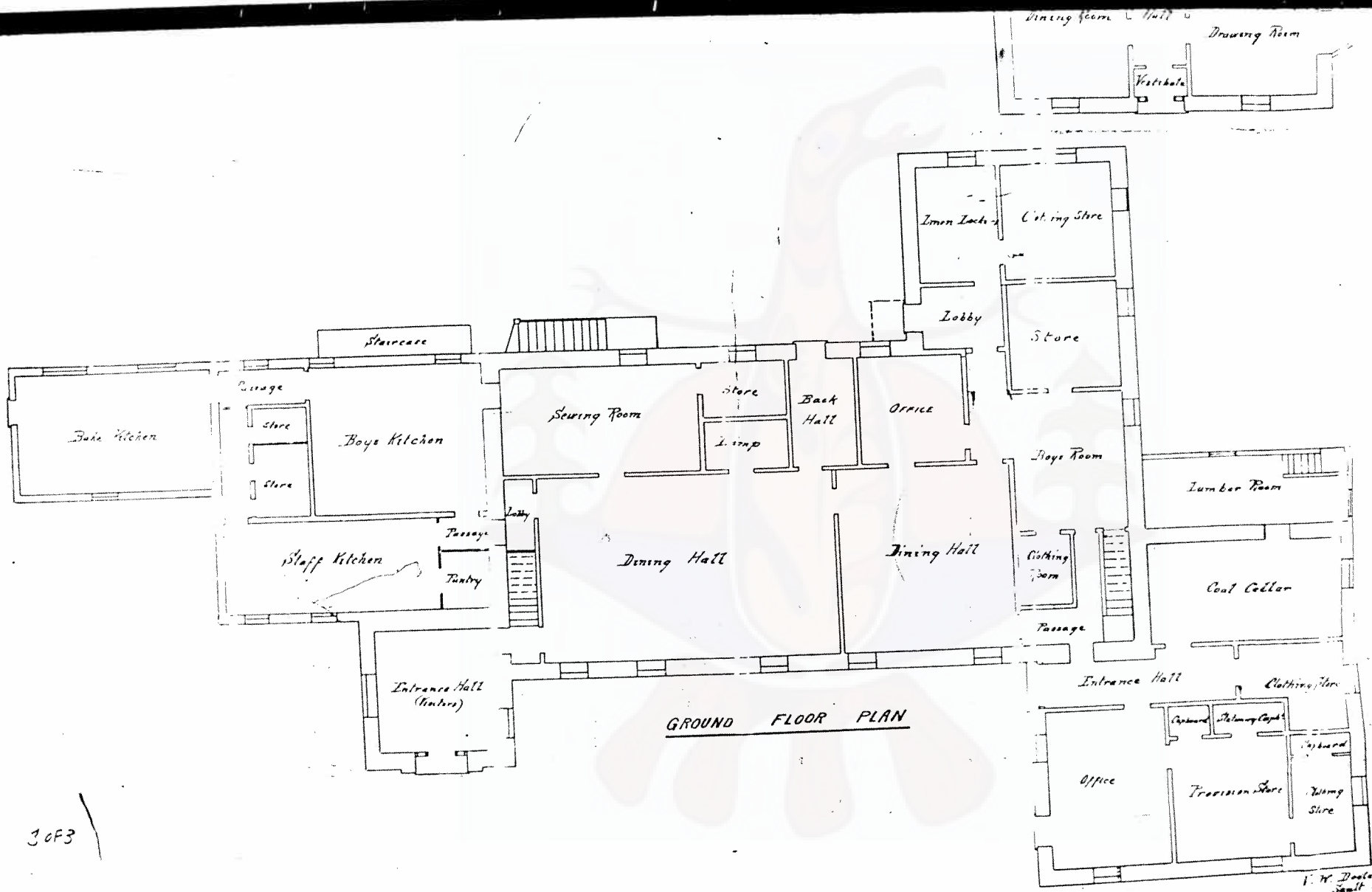


TOP FLOOR PLAN

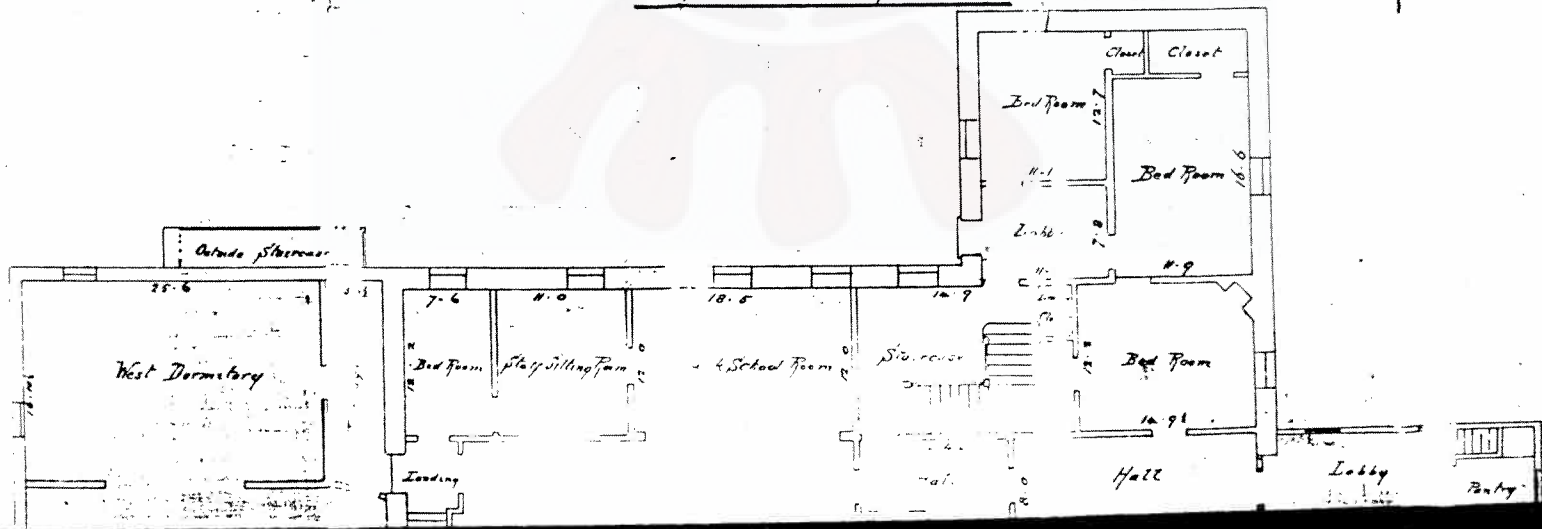


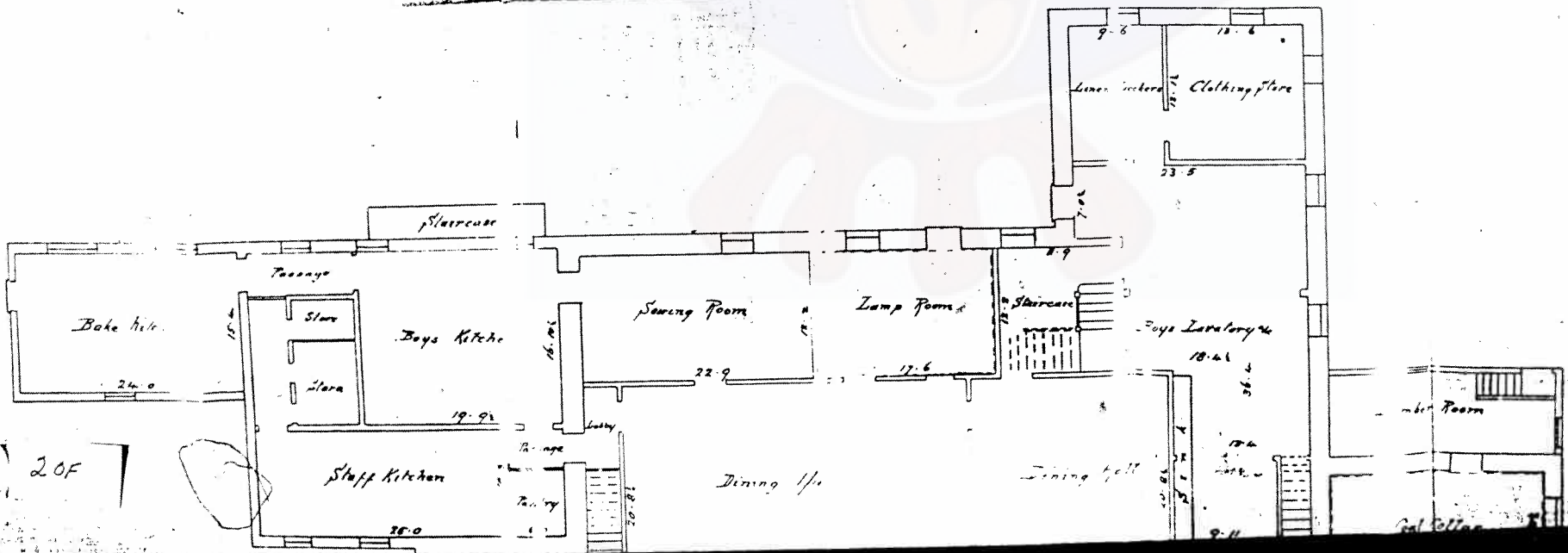
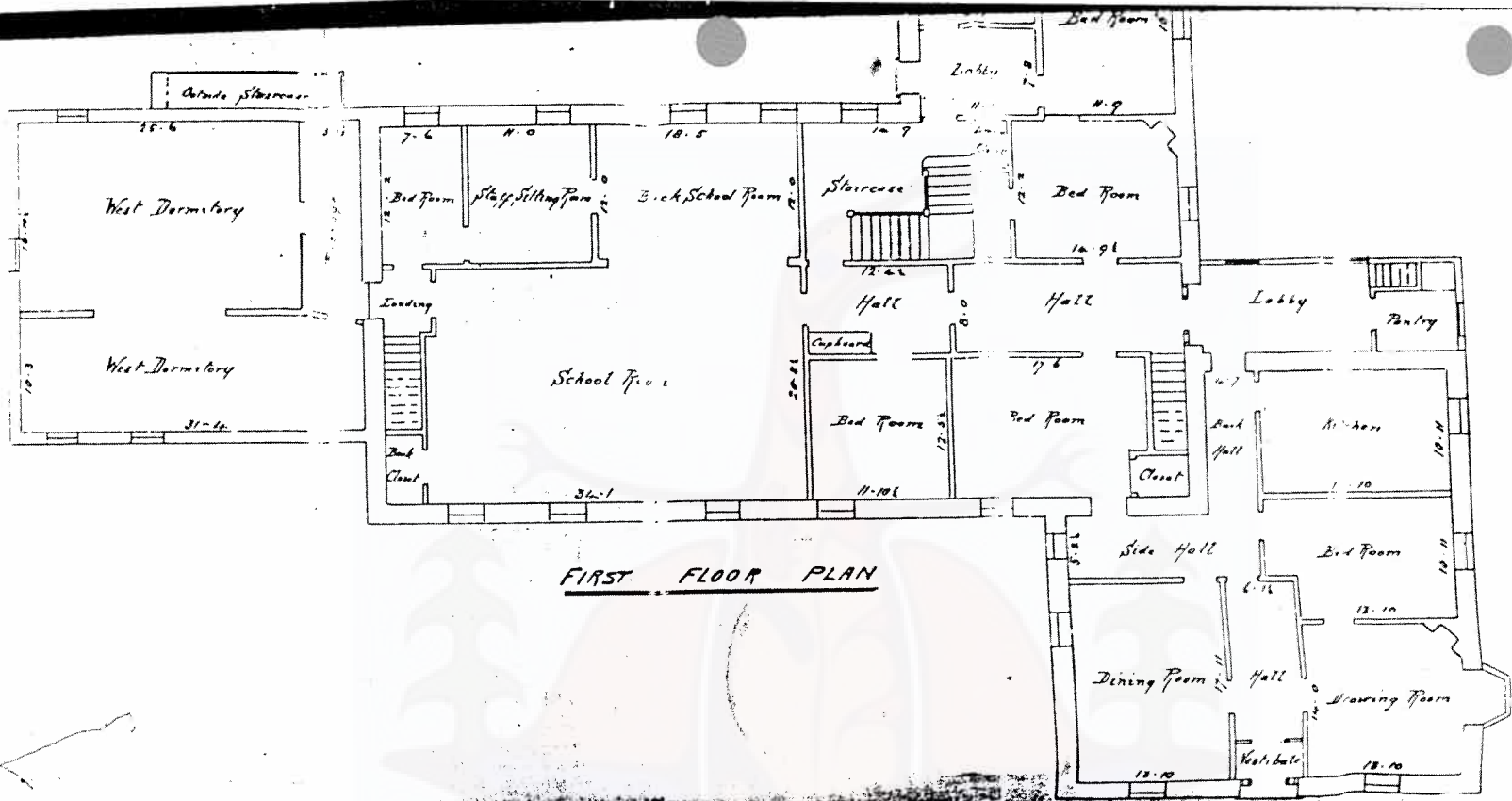
PLAN OF THE SIINGWAUK HOYE

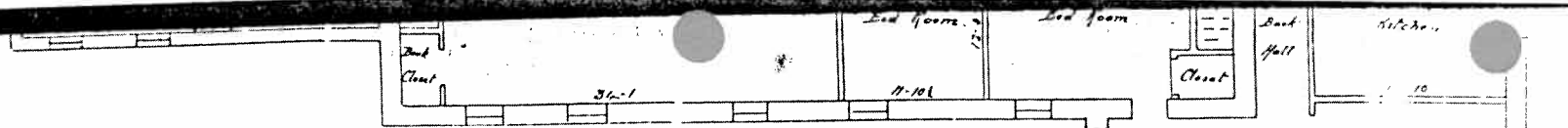

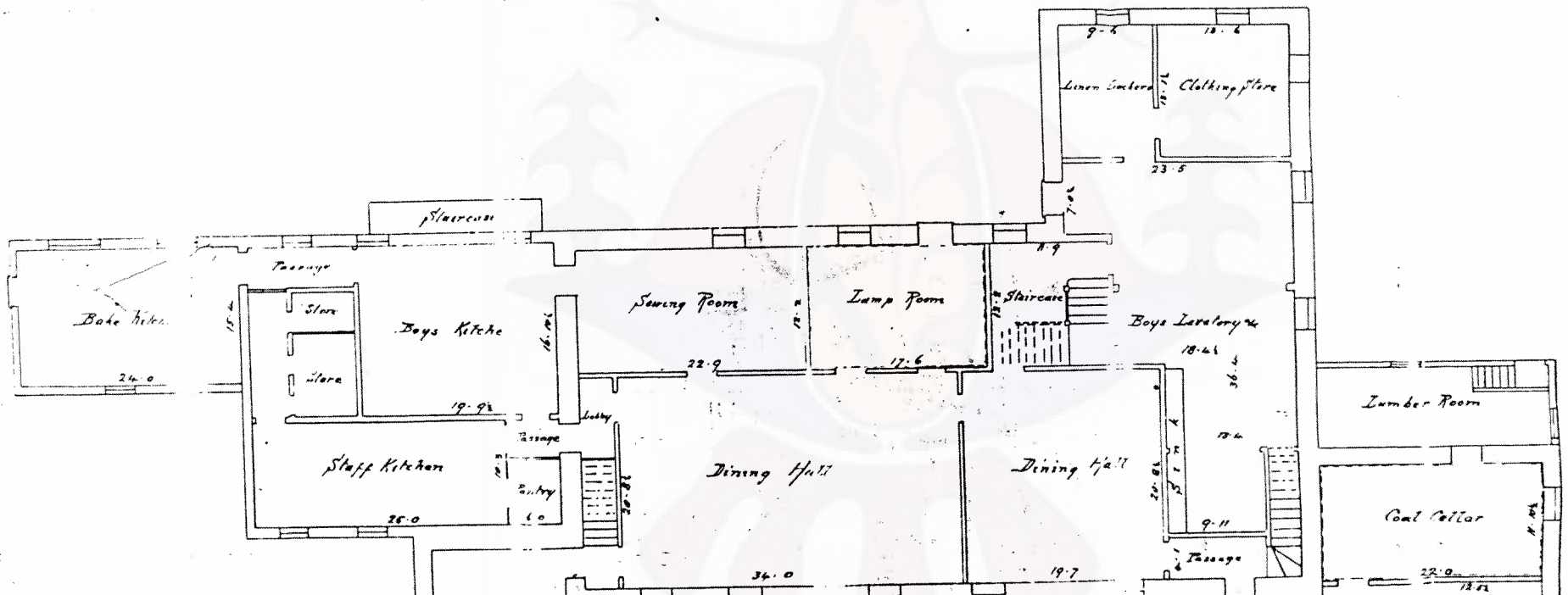
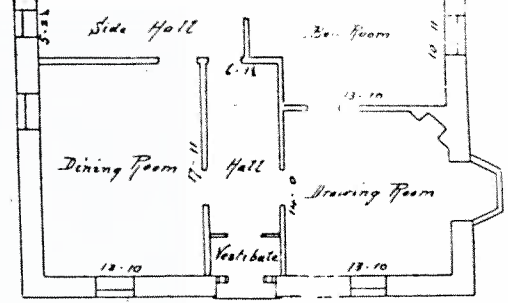
TOP FLOOR PLAN



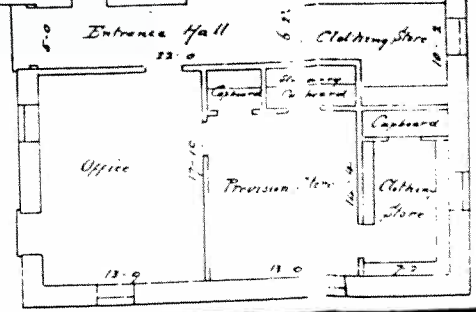




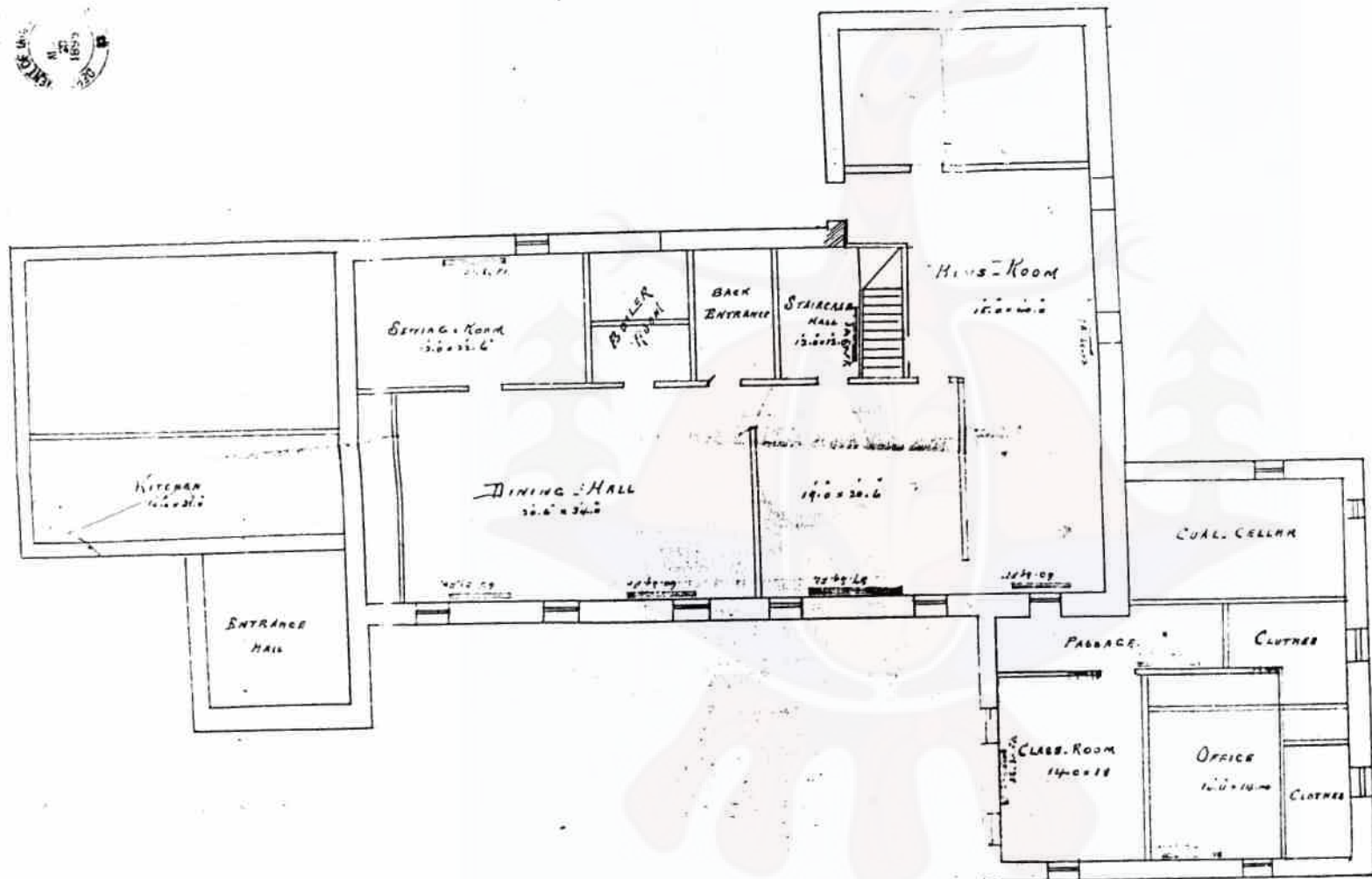
FIRST FLOOR PLAN



GROUND FLOOR PLAN

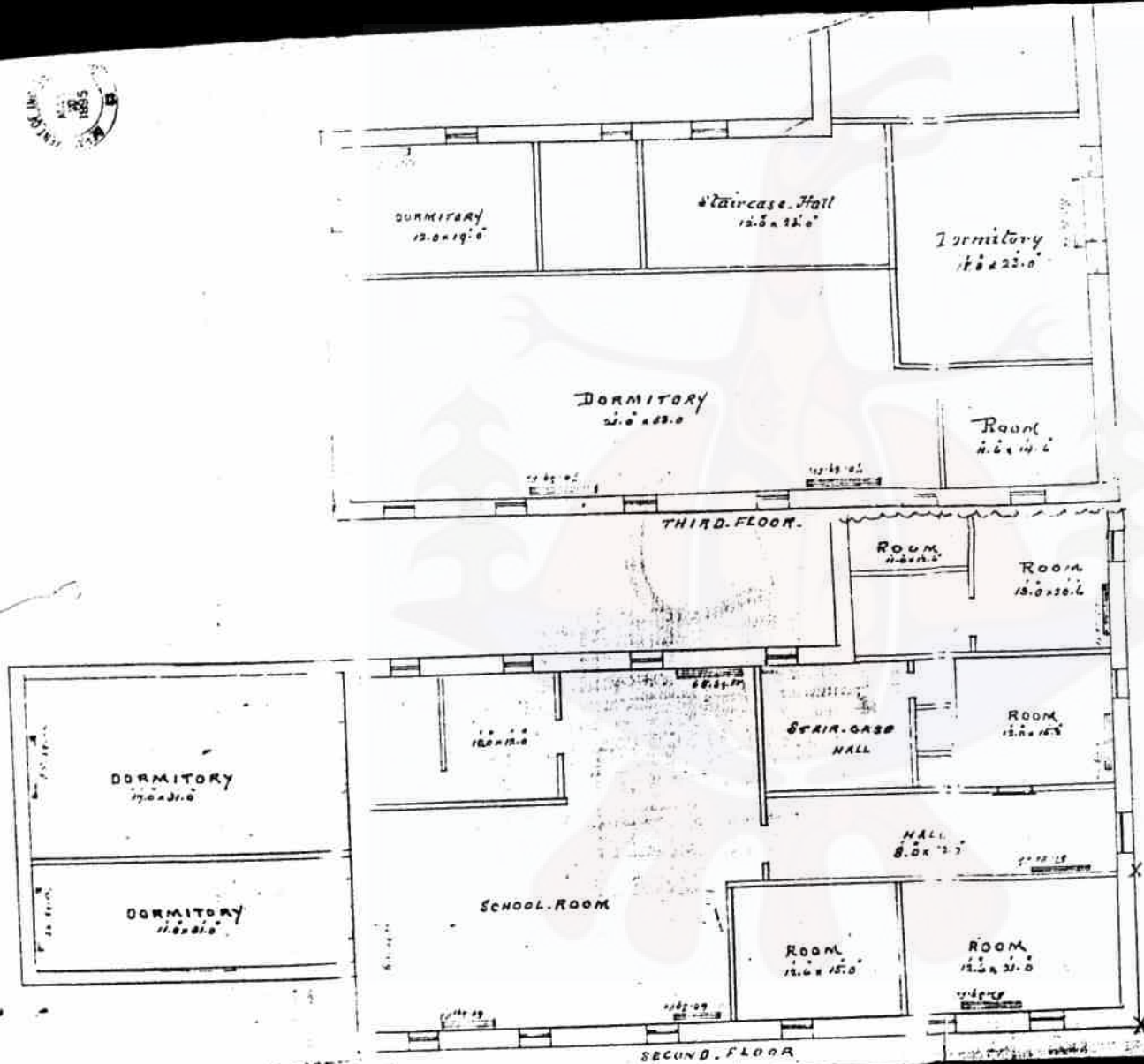


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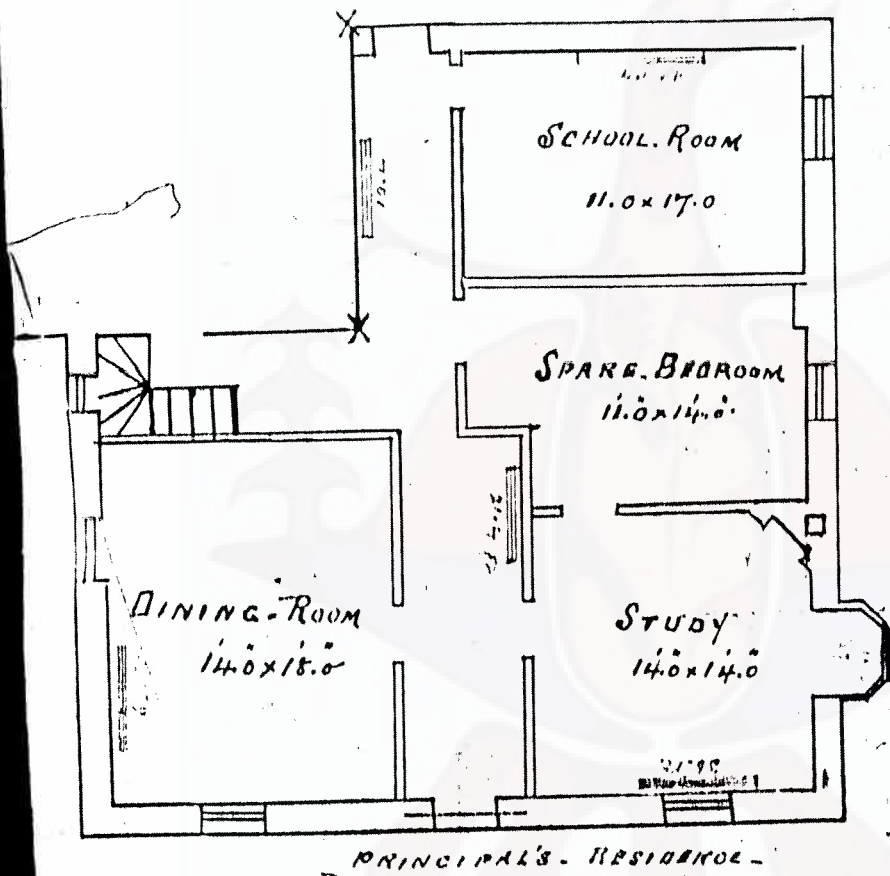

Dear Sirs:-

The Committee named by you and undersigned have made an examination of the school, particularly in regard to the prevalence of Tuberculosis and Typhoid Fever, and beg to report as follows:-

1st. As to Tuberculosis.

It appears to us that the building occupied by the scholars lacks sufficient light, ventilation and recreation space. The ceilings are too low, but this would not be serious if they and the walls were bright in color and easily cleaned. The high wooden wainscoting and walls should be replaced by hard plaster, tile, or at least painted or calomined in light color; the floors also are open and need renewing. What plaster there is is rough and thus favors the accumulation of dust in which tubercular bacilli thrive.

There is practically no recreation space provided and that used by the boys, we think positively injurious, as it is used as their wash and scrub room, is largely underground and lighted by only two half windows. The walls are dark and the whole apartment dingy.

The girls' recreation room has not the same faults, but as it is used also as a dining room, it is hardly a place in which they can romp and take necessary exercise.

The place allotted for sleeping room would probably be sufficient under ordinary conditions, but owing to the susceptibility of the inmates to tuberculosis, it is questionable if it would not be better to provide more space, or better still a means of changing the air in the rooms frequently.

We also find that there are a few children suffering from tuberculosis attending the school in whom the signs of disease are quite evident in the lungs, glands or bones. Such cases should never be admitted, and in cases where the disease develops in the school, should

be isolated and sent home or to some Sanitarium for the treatment of tuberculosis. This implies a more thorough examination of applicants for admission and if we may, we would suggest, that in addition to the examination now required, you inquire into the previous illnesses and family history of each applicant, and have the school physician make a thorough examination before such applicant is finally admitted. If cases with a marked pre-disposition to tuberculosis of incipient cases are not admitted, the health of the school will be safe guarded.

To sum up, we would advise the removal of all tuberculosis cases now present and as much as possible prevent the admission of other cases. Also a thorough renovation of the buildings; this to include disinfection by fumigation, also, as far as practicable, changes that would provide more recreation space, light and ventilation.

End. As to Typhoid Fever.

This disease has been very prevalent in the school, owing probably to its drainage contaminating its water supply. The sewerage and drainage from the building and outbuildings empties into a small bay or basin of the river in front of the school. A few yards lower down the river, the intake pipe is situated and thus in the current that drains the basin referred to. Besides this, there is the possibility of contamination of the water supply by the town sewerage entering the river at a higher level. The drains from the buildings are open.

We would suggest a thorough system of house drainage with closets, urinals and bath-rooms, a water supply independent of the river, say from a deep well pumped by a wind mill or other power.

We find that as much as possible Typhoid Fever is being prevented by boiling the water used by the inmates, but it is almost impossible to have instructions carried out by the scholars.

We have to thank Mr. King for the kindly way in which he facilitated our inspection of the premises, and we wish to add that the school is as



cleanly and as wholesome as its construction and inherent conditions will permit.

The committee of the Shingwauk Indian Home have had under consideration some much needed improvements in the Home, which will be conducive to the more economical management of the institution; a laundry building and some additional machinery, a good sanitary barn and stable, electric lighting, and one or two minor items. The Home at present has about one hundred inmates; the present washing facilities are old and inadequate; the barn accommodation needs to be thoroughly renovated and made clean and sanitary, as all the milk for the children comes from these buildings, and it is needless to emphasize the necessity of keeping the premises clean and sanitary. The cost of installation of the electric light may be partly borne by the city, but the distance is so great from the city that it is doubtful if the city would pay the whole cost of

running the wires.

The effect of these improvements would be to place the Home in a very much improved sanitary condition and make it more desirable as a public institution. The change from lamps to electric lights is highly desirable where there are so many children and there is continuous danger of fire.

The above is a general outline of what is required. My object in writing you is to ask your view as to whether your department will entertain this proposition. I am sure that anything that will aid in improving the condition of the Home, especially as to sanitation and danger from fire, will receive the utmost sympathy at your hands, and I should be glad if you will send me a line intimating what would be the policy of the department as regards the expenditure involved in these improvements.



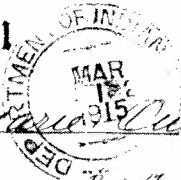

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GREEN ON THE SHINGWAUK HOME.

I am of opinion that the heating plant is defective or is not well managed. It was a cold wet day when school was visited and neither school room was comfortable. I would suggest that a thermometer be placed in each room and the temperature kept at 67 degrees if possible.

Senior class room is rather overcrowded and junior is light at present. The result is that there is not sufficient air space for number of pupils in senior room. Twice the space should be provided.

Reverend Sir,-

In a recent report on the Shingwauk Home, Inspector Green states that neither school room was comfortably heated. He recommended that <sup>a</sup>the thermometers be placed in each class-room and that the temperature be kept at 67 degrees. Two thermometers will be supplied by the Department and the Department will expect the class rooms to be kept at the temperature recommended by the inspector.

The Inspector, also, stated that the senior class room is overcrowded. The Department considers that the classes should be so arranged that there would be 16 square feet of floor space and 250 cubic feet of air space, for each pupil in the class room.



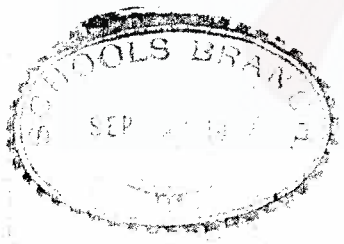

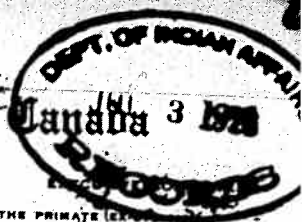

Honourable Charles Stewart.

Canon Gould, General Secretary of the Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, and the Superintendent of Indian Education visited, this week, the Shingwauk Home, an Indian Residential School near Sault Ste. Marie. Mr. Ferrier reports that Canon Gould and the Rev. Principal have drawn his attention to certain repairs and replacements to buildings, that should be undertaken without delay. 28,000 shingles are required for a portion of the roof of the main building; 85 bbls. of cement are required to replace the old wooden floor in the barn; a metal sheeted roof is also needed for the barn. Our officer made an arrangement with the Rev. Principal that, if the materials were supplied and two carpenters were employed, the school staff and larger boys would give their help and that gravel, stone and rough lumber would be supplied by the school.

The cost of the materials and the wages for two carpenters would be in the neighborhood of \$950. I should be pleased to have your authority to authorize the repairs. This school has received very little assistance from Parliamentary Appropriation, other than the per capita grant. The Principal has done splendid work and is quite competent to supervise the activities that I have recommended. Funds are available in the Vote for Indian Education.



During my recent visit to the Shingwauk Home which lasted from Jan. 5th to 7th, I was able to go carefully into the matter of the requirements of this School for the current year. You will have before you the list of requirements forwarded to your Department through our General Secretary for all of our Society's Indian Residential Schools, the Shingwauk Home included. The total amount requested was \$1,800.00 made up as follows:-

- |                      |           |
|----------------------|-----------|
| 1. Root house        | \$ 600.00 |
| 2. Half mile fencing | 200.00    |
| 3. General repairs   | 1,000.00  |

During my recent visit the Principal mentioned the following as the most urgent requirements of this school:-

1. One mile fencing
2. Poultry run
3. Painting of all our-buildings (white and red)
4. The renewal of all chimneys.

With regard to the fencing, painting and poultry run, if the materials are supplied the school management will do the work. They could not, however, undertake to rebuild the chimneys, but will help in every way possible with this work and the building of a root house.

One of the most urgent needs of this school, and it was referred to your Department some time ago, is the need of additional land. The School has at present only 49 acres set apart for its use. In addition to this, 90 acres are rented every year and for which our Society pays an annual rental of \$250.00. The rented land is situated about two miles from the school, and can only be worked at considerable inconvenience to the school management.

I commend the above requirements and items of business to your sympathetic consideration and will be obliged if you will let me know in due course what action you are taking with regard to the same.

When these estimates are to hand, further consideration will be given by the Department.

You will recall that at the time of my recent visit to Sault Ste. Marie we discussed together various needs of the Shingwauk Home. Prominent amongst these, mention was made of the following:-

- (1) Laundry
  - (a) Repairs to the cylindrical washer or a complete new washer.
  - (b) Installation of shaft and pulley so that the mangle could be used.
  - (c) New belts for the washer and mangle.
  - (d) The conversion of the window between the main building and the up-stairs of the laundry, into a doorway.
  - (e) Installation of proper ironing tables in the laundry upstairs.
- (2) Children's Dining Room

New tables and benches, the tables to be covered with heavy linoleum, bound on with brass or wooden strips.
- (3) Farm
  - (a) Additional land.
  - ✓ (b) Threshing machine. - See no 14 file
- (4) General Repairs to the main building .

Up to the present I have not heard that any of these improvements have been effected, and I shall be

grateful if you will give special attention to the items mentioned under

- (1) Laundry
- (2) Children's Dining Room and
- (3) General Repairs to Main building.

Of these, precedence should, in my opinion, be given to the Laundry items, but the others should also be supplied.

The Public School Inspector, in a report on his recent inspection of the Shingwauk Indian Residential School, states as follows regarding the desks:

"The smallest desks in the school are size 3 non-adjustable. About eight or ten little ones are seated in entirely unsuitable seats. One row of five adjustable #3 with an extra rear and extra front would make an enormous improvement".

In this connection I have to request that you will state the name of the manufacturer of the desks at present in the school, also whether they are single or double desks. I may say that we do not supply adjustable desks. It is noted that the desks which the Inspector recommends are for the smaller pupils, but it is considered that any extra desks should be of the single type to accommodate pupils between 7 and 9 years. Please give full information as to the size and type of the extra desks required, when consideration will be given to supplying same.

The Department does not appear to have received any reply to its communication to you of July 23rd, last, relative to the laundry equipment, renewals and general repairs required.

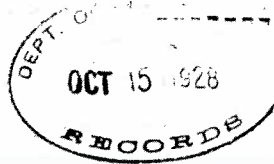

In looking over some files I found the enclosed which I believe should have been sent in to your Office.

The account may have been paid because I have not heard from the party who did the repairs on the motor. and I would expect some notice if it was still unpaid.

The motor had been in use in our Laundry for nearly ten years. and given good service, serving the laundry work, Grinding all the cattle feed, and sawing all our wood. And now since it has been rebuilt it is as good as new. We are perfectly satisfied, in fact it is better than we expected it could be made.

The matter of a small Threshing machine has been mentioned in a letter to the Department some time ago, (you were away at the time) and I would like your advice in the matter. This year our grain crop will be light, owing to the bad harvesting weather, but it is very unsatisfactory having a big machine from outside come in to thresh. And on the other hand there is a lot of pleasure in doing our own threshing and teaching the boys what will be useful to them some time.

We have used the Garden River Machine last year, but it is a lot of work to fix it so that it will do proper work, after the people there use it for a season.

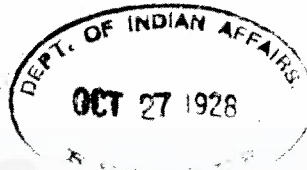

Dear Sir:-

Our School the Shingwauk Home, is built with the main floor close to the ground, and the three furnaces are placed three feet below the ground. No basement, and always we have much trouble with water in the pits where the furnaces are located. During the past wet season these pits have been full of water, and no drain to carry it off, other years we have bailed the water out, often having to do so every day.

Lately we decided to open a drain from where the land drops down to the river to the house. In doing this we discovered an old wood box drain rotted and filled in. We have opened this drain, and wish to lay it with tile drain pipe. This must be done at once as the excavating is done, and to assure you that this will be effectual in taking off the water, I can tell you that as soon as we had the drain open the water went out in a short time. This drain that we have opened will pass through our vegetable garden and will be beneficial in a double way.

The length of the drain is Five  
Hundred and Twenty Five Feet ,

525 Feet of drain tile @ 70¢ per ft. ----- 36.75.

Will you please ask the Indian Department if they would consider giving us this grant as it would mean much comfort to us in our work, and also make the building more healthy.

We shall ever be thankful.

I have been instructed by our Commission to direct your attention to the heavy expenditure which they are obliged to make from year to year for bread at the Shingwauk Home, and to ask you to kindly give very careful consideration to the question of providing this School with facilities for baking bread. In support of this request I beg to state that the bills which were paid by our Commission for bread at this School during the year 1928, amounted to \$2,117.10. Had the Commission purchased the flour required to meet the needs of the staff and pupils at their schedule rate of allowance which is 75 lbs. per head per Quarter, the total cost of this flour would have amounted to \$1,035.00 f.o.b. S.Ste. Marie, and they would thereby have effected a saving of \$1,082.10.

As the average per capita cost of food at a number of our Society's other Schools where bread-baking facilities are provided, is only approximately \$45.00 a year, while the average per capita cost of this same item at the Shingwauk Home is \$62.00 a year, it is obvious that the lack of baking facilities is very largely responsible for the difference.

On various occasions during my visit to your Department, I have made known the wish of our Commission to have the baking facilities provided, not only in order that the operating expenses of the institution might be reduced, but that the pupils might benefit by this branch of education as well. On each occasion, a note was made of my request, and sympathetic consideration of the situation promised. So far, however, no action has been taken, and our Commission has lost

We find it very satisfactory both to the pupil and to ourselves, to have the larger boys doing some work that will teach them in something that will be useful for them to know when they must earn their own living. And also very profitable to have the boys keep the buildings painted, and needful work done while at the same time they are learning.

I may say that we are able to teach the boys how to do such work, and although we cannot afford to have a real mechanic, still it would be well in a double sense to have material to employ the boys and improve the buildings.

I am sure you will give this your kind consideration, and advice..

The Principal of the Shingwauk Home has for some time been urging our Commission to provide this institution with a new kitchen range, and our Commission have decided to supply a good size electric cooking range, if your Department would assist them in meeting the cost of the heavier wiring system which would be required in this connection. An estimate of the cost involved as submitted by the Principal is \$100.00, and I shall be glad to know if there is any possibility of your Department undertaking to meet this expenditure.

In making this request I am not unmindful of the information set forth in your letter of May 7th last, #13-0-5, and wherein you state, in part, that the sum of \$600.00 is available for the erection of a root house at this school this year. A certain amount of this sum will already have been absorbed in providing the baking facilities requested in my letter to you on May 25th., but I have not yet received any information from the Principal as to whether the whole amount has been absorbed in this way or not. The need is undoubtedly urgent and as our Commission have agreed to provide the range, I sincerely trust that your Department may find some way to meet the cost of the necessary wiring system up to the amount of the Principal's estimate.

Dear Sir:

I made an examination of the Shingwauk Indian Home yesterday and find the sanitary conditions there rather unsatisfactory. The boys' bath tubs have never been connected to the sewer and where they are now placed is very unsatisfactory. The Principals' quarters, which have not been occupied for some time, are uninhabitable. The roof leaks, the floors in the lower flat are rotten, the walls are cracked, the plaster is falling off and the whole place is in a generally dilapidated state. It requires a thorough renovating before it will be fit to live in.

I examined the children and found them free from any contagious disease. There are eight children who have enlarged and infected tonsils which should be removed.

On account of the recent presence of two cases of active tuberculosis in the school I think it would be advisable to have all the children tuberculin tested. If the Department wishes this done I will be glad to do it at any time.

Dear Sir:

Just recently I have taken over the Principalship of the Shingwauk Residential School, and looking over the building, I find it in a very bad state, both from the standpoint of repair as well as being unsanitary and unsafe ~~by~~ reason of the heating system used, and the poor protection installed.

I have my wife and two children here, and am anxious to get settled down before the cold weather starts. But am unable to do so on account of the Principal's apartments being uninhabitable.

I understand that these apartments have not been used for some years. The walls are badly cracked, the doors and windows are illfitting, and the floors in places are decaying and have large holes in. On account of there being no basement in either the school building or the Principal's apartments, the underjoists are decaying, and on the whole conditions are undesirable. Also there is no toilet or bathroom in the Principal's apartments.

I would appreciate it very much indeed if you would come and see things for yourself, and also to kindly recommend the Department to help us to make the place habitable.

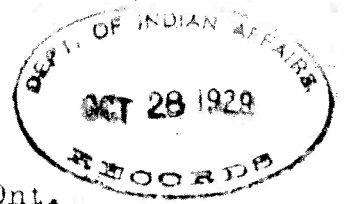

Sir,—

I beg to enclose two letters which I have received, one from the Rev. Principal Hives of the Shingwauk Home, and one from Dr. A. S. McCaig reporting on conditions existing at the Shingwauk Residential School.

Upon receipt of the Rev. Principal's letter I investigated conditions myself, and found the Principal's apartments in very bad state of repair, so much so that I hesitate to make any further recommendations as to what should be done. In my humble opinion the whole building should be scrapped. It seems to me that any further money spent on these buildings is money thrown away as it can never be made a modern school building. Every Grand Jury that has visited the place during the past ten years have condemned the buildings.

I concur with Dr. McCaig in what he says as to the unsanitary condition of the school, and believe it unsafe for Indian children who are predisposed to tuberculosis trouble.

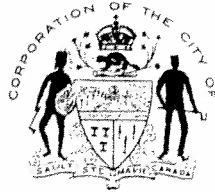
I would strongly recommend that the Department send a representative up to go into the matter thoroughly at the earliest possible date, as Mr. Hives with his wife and family are occupying rooms belonging to the staff, which is causing no little inconvenience.

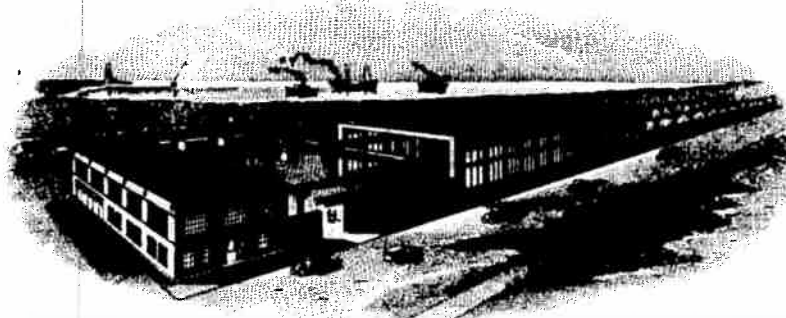

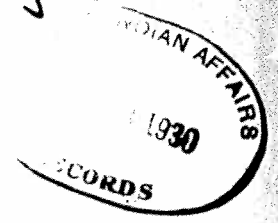

While Mr Orr, your architect, was here looking over the prospective site, this matter was mentioned, and he favoured the septic tank system. At the present time the sewage empties into the river without going through any process such as septic tank.

I would certainly recommend that a proper septic tank system be established to handle this matter. Our pupils bathe in the river below where the sewage empties, that in itself is not good, and may cause serious health trouble sometime.

As there is no mention of this matter in the specifications, would you kindly let me know what system would be adopted, so that I may inform the contractors of this.

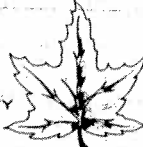

I beg to send herewith an **analysis** by the Departmental Architect of the tenders received for the erection of an Indian Residential School at Sault Ste. Marie. You will kindly note that Mr. Orr does not recommend that the contract be awarded on these tenders, as he thinks the offers are too high. I agree with him. The appropriation for Indian Education for the current year provides only \$50,000.00 for this building. This was to be a preliminary vote. We intended to start the work late in the spring and to provide the balance of the necessary funds in next year's Estimates. I think we should postpone action for the present and take time to consider the matter carefully. I would recommend that the security deposits made by the tenderers be returned.

Dear Sir:

Would you kindly take up a matter with the Department in connection with the heating of our school. Of course, it is recognised by the Department that our heating system is very poor, and that the only real remedy is an entirely new system, but the Winter is coming on, and the present means of heating has to be patched up as well as we can do it. The two classrooms are heated by stove heaters. That is, they have the hot water radiators installed in them, but these, insufficient to give the proper heat. The stove heater heretofore used are old, and in a dangerous condition, and require new ones. These will cost in the neighbourhood of not more than \$70.00. The furnaces need new grates, and I estimate the cost of these installed would be \$30.00.

I have been trying to fix up a room for a boy's readingroom. Some of our boys have to do study work in the evening, and they cannot do this in the playroom, and the classrooms are not convenient. We have quite a good room off the boy's playroom, and if it had proper heating installed, it would make a very good room for the boys. I can have a radiator taken from another part of the building where it is not really required. To do this would cost approximately \$15.00.

Would you kindly take this matter up, so that if possible the work may be done as soon as possible.

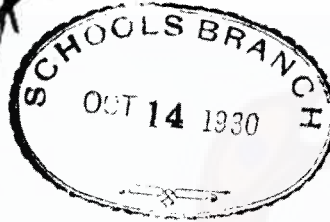


Rev. Sir:

I am sorry to have to inform you that our hot water heating system in the boys' department has played out. It consists of a large cauldron or feed boiler. I tried to get it repaired, but it is too far gone. We must have another to take its place, as it is the only means we have of heating water for bathing the boys, and for scrubbing the boys' rooms.

Would you kindly place this matter before the Department and ask them if ~~you~~ would kindly supply us with another. The cost would be not over sixty dollars.

I may also say that the main water pipe into the Shingwauk Home has no shut-off. Some of the pipes are in very poor shape and liable to cause trouble, as they are leaking. I think it is very necessary that there should be a valve near the entrance of the water supply so that the water can be controlled if necessary. At the present time, it would have to be done in the city, over a mile away. The cost of installing this shut-off would be forty dollars.

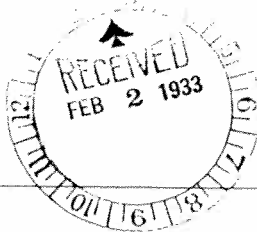

Memorandum:

The Honourable the Superintendent General.

An item of \$50,000.00 was placed in the Estimates for 1930-1931 to commence the construction of a new building for the Shingwauk Home, Sault Ste Marie, Ontario. Owing to the necessity for rigid economy at the time, this item was afterwards disallowed.

The main building of this school was erected in 1874 by the Anglican Church authorities and, at the time of placing the item in the Estimates, was in a very unsatisfactory condition. Temporary repairs had been made from time to time, but inspections showed that there was a very serious fire hazard and that the pupils and staff were living under very unsanitary conditions.

The Superintendent of Indian Education inspected the school at that time and reported that owing to the age and condition of the building, repairs which would render it safe and satisfactory for occupation would be very costly, and for this reason only minor repairs, which were absolutely necessary, were made until such time as funds would be available for the erection of a new building.

It is my intention to visit the Shingwauk Home at the end of this month in company with Mr. Orr, after which I expect to be able to make a definite recommendation.

Dear Sir:

Our furnaces are requiring immediate repairs, owing, I think, to the constant use they have had this winter. I have estimated the cost to be approximately \$35.00. Will you kindly place this matter before the Department at your earliest convenience. We also need very much repairing done on the building, but in view of the possibility of a new building in the not-too-distance future, I would recommend that only really necessary repairs be made. These consist of tinting of walls in some of the dormitories, play-room etc., These should be done in order to make them, or keep them sanitary. Floors in playrooms require patching, and some of the roof requires repairing. I estimate the cost would be approximately \$100.00. I would be very much obliged if you would place this matter before the Department, asking them to make us this grant, so that the work may be done before the heavier outside work comes on.

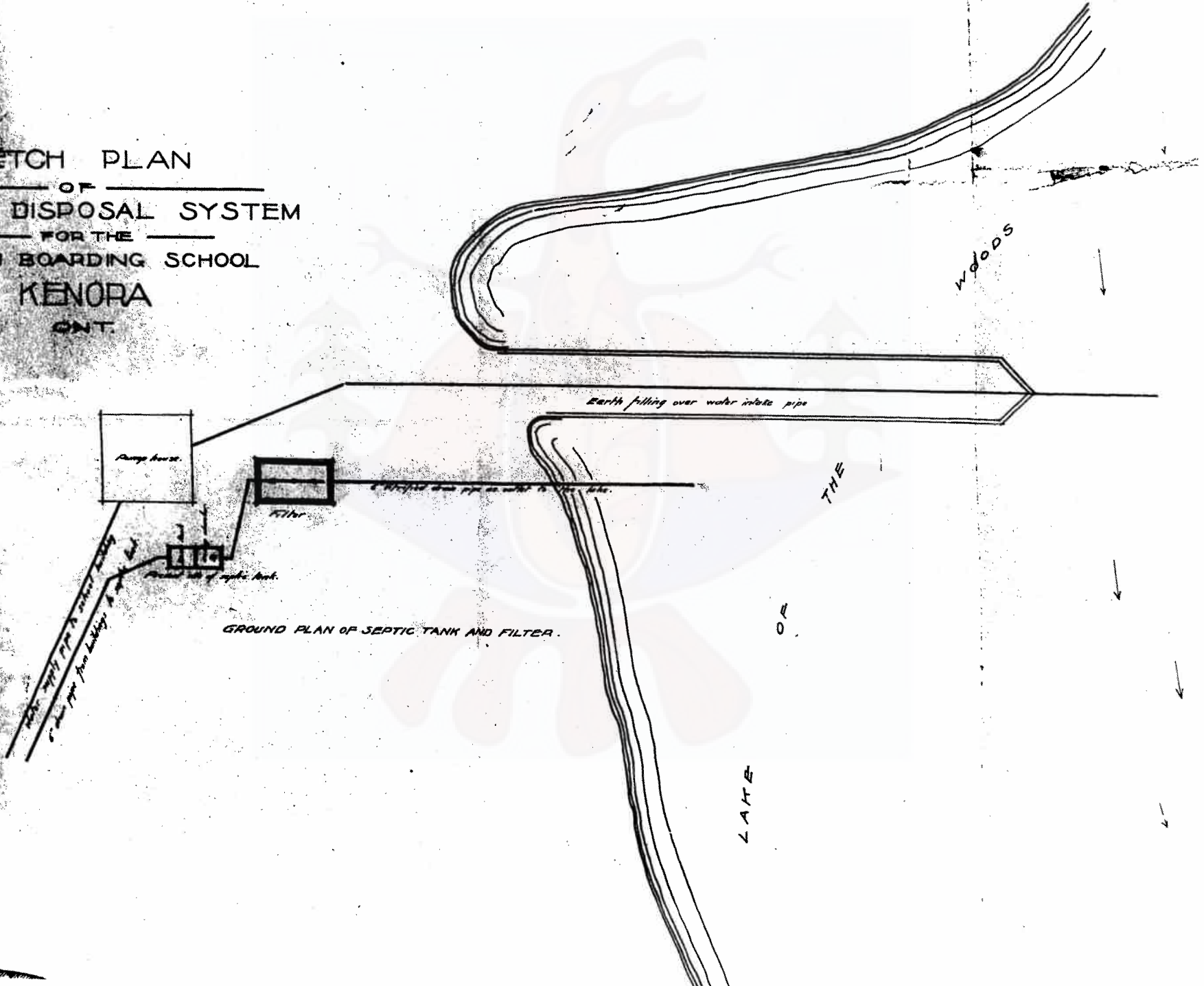

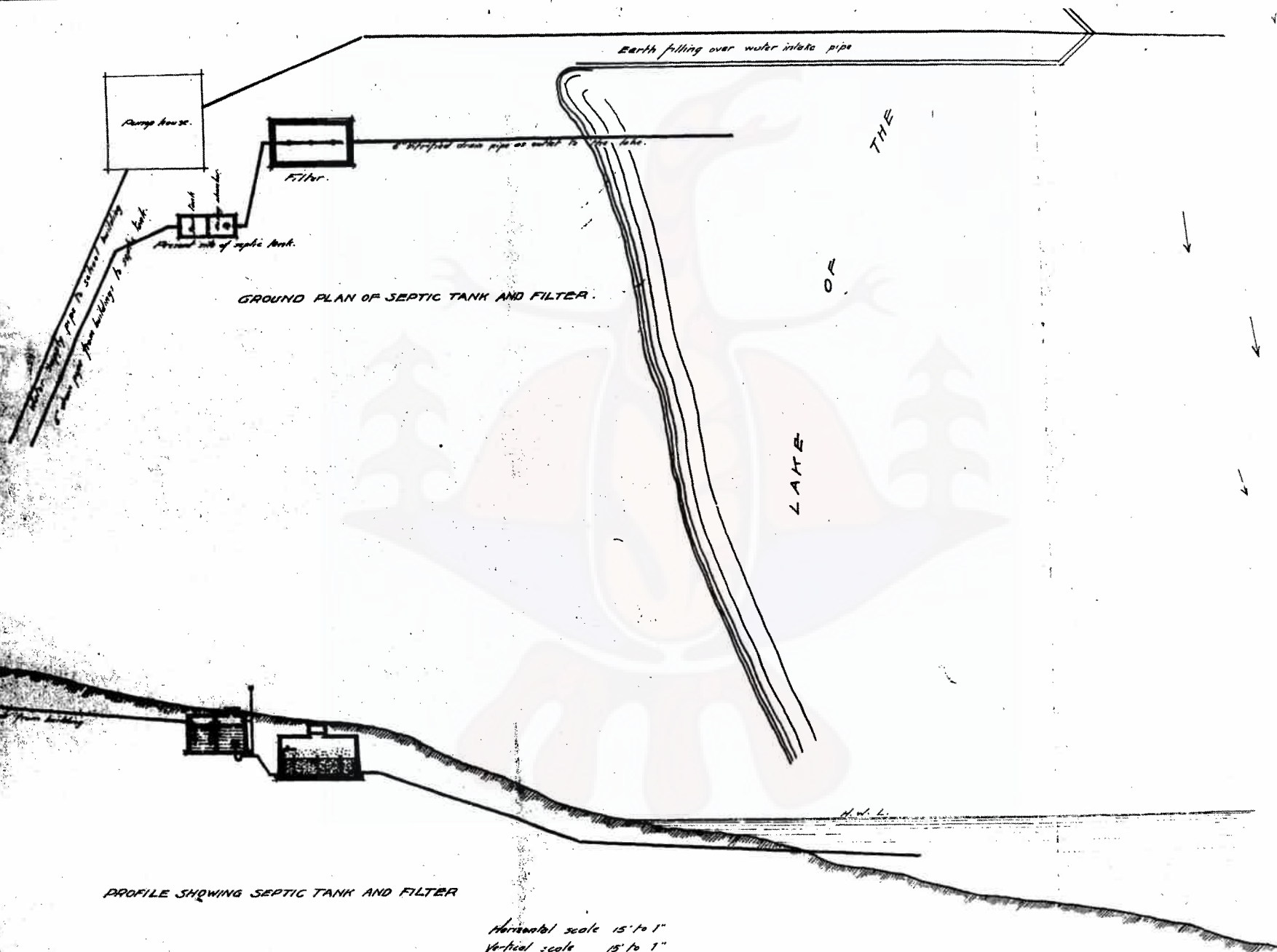

PROFILE SHOWING SEPTIC TANK AND FILTER

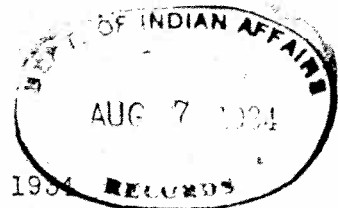

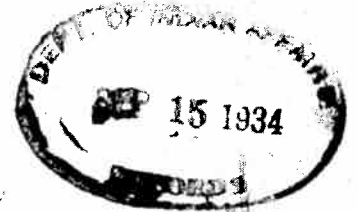

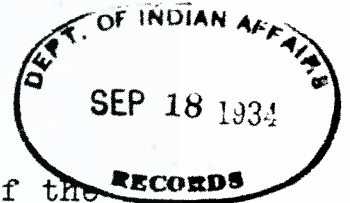
