

school this year in larger number than any pre-  
ious year. We have already 96 boys, 95 girls, a  
few more are to come soon, and I have refused quite  
a number for want of room and not to exceed  
the number of 200 for both institutions.  
Comes the question if we should refit our school  
to accommodate a larger number of children or  
not. We are ready to do it if the Department of Indian  
Affairs would guarantee the go. ordinary grant  
for a number of children not exceeding 250,  
boys and girls. The girls school is large enough  
in all its parts for 125 children. The boys dormi-  
tory can contain only 100 beds, but this can be enlarged  
by adding half of the third story of the staff  
building. All other parts of the house are large  
enough for 125 children.

It is my opinion that the boarding school will  
be more and more the means of educating the  
Indians of this part of the country. The day schools  
have not reached great many Indian children.

as before grouped in villages, they rather tend to disperse all over their respective reserve for farming purpose. The high wages in saw mills and timber camps, the berry picking, sugar making keep always many families shifting about. For these reasons, some schools around here have to close periodically; so Serpent River School, Spanish River (Dagamok), South Bay, Whitefish Lake . . .

The new location of our boarding school has afforded school facilities to many band of Indians who had never previously sent children to Mikinew. We now received children from Repising, Dokis bands, from Abitibi, Maniwaki and we have application from Lake Superior Indians. I have already refuse quite a number of children and some are orphans or destitute children.

If the Indian Department allows us to increase the number of our boarders, we will prepare to answer all the applications.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of yours of the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. concerning the increase of grant earning pupils in our school. The answer was in the negative for the reason that the appropriation for school purposes is limited.

Then I would beg the Department to consider another proposition. Our school has now the full number of children allowed: 100 boys. There is no margin left for urgent cases that present themselves now and then. Lately I had to refuse five very poor and orphan boys for the reason that the number of children allowed in our school was filled. Parents will bring us from far distance children without previous notice. It is not easy to turn them away.

There are here some 7 or 8 boys undesirable, just beginning to be <sup>to be</sup> insubordinate, exercising bad influence on others. One of them is seropulous, one has sore eyes. I would propose the discharge of these boys as they draw very little advantage by being here and therefore the place of others. If this is granted, which I desire much, I would propose names and add explanation.

I would be pleased to receive soon our cheques for the quarter ending Sept 30<sup>th</sup>. We are in such need of money. The Secy. of the Dep't of Ind. Affairs sincerely yours,

No doubt you have been informed of the great trial we have undergone these last weeks. The Spanish Influenza has visited us in all its severity. It broke out first at the girls school, the 21st Oct., and in three days, all the girls except three and some members of the staff were in bed. Three days after it started in the boys school, and in a few days, all the boys, except three and six members of the staff were sick. We had many serious cases, lungs, kidneys, and ears troubles, many cases of pneumonia. I regret to state that we had to regulate some losses in both schools; the following is the death record: Oct. 28, No 0402 Anna Oshawatine, 17 years, 5th Standard, Manitoulin unseeded; Oct. 29, No 0447, Ellen Manitowash, 5 years 1st Std. Cockburn Island; Oct. 31, No 0482, Ernestine Corbiere, 7 years 1st Std. West Bay; Oct 31<sup>st</sup> No 0295 Mathilda Bienville, 16 years, 5 std. Thessalon; Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> No 0381 Rose Abenignans, 10 years 4 std. Manitoulin unseeded; Nov. 3<sup>rd</sup> No 0395 Mary Medneish 12 years 3 std. Manitoulin unseeded. Nov. 3<sup>rd</sup> No 0288 Annie Begoniasong 14 years 5 std. Manitoulin unseeded. Nov. 12 No 0448 Virginia Corbiere 9 years 1st Std. West Bay.

We have still a few in bed recovering very slowly.  
Some of the most serious cases who have partly recovered  
might remain so weak that they would not be able  
to attend their school duties, and some might  
develop tubercular diseases. I will report on such  
cases if experience prove they turn that way.

Thank to the Indian Department, we have been well  
supplied with drugs. We tried to give the children  
the best medical and nursing attendance we  
could in those in the circumstances we were.  
We had the help of one infirmerian from Sud-  
bury and of two from Montreal.

I was pleased to receive a letter of our Mr Agent  
of The saloon J. Baque in which he makes the  
following statement from Mr J. Elliot of the  
Ind. Dep't: "Replying to your letter of the 29th  
reporting outbreak of Influenza at the Industrial  
School at Spanish, the Department approves of Dr  
Mc Dermott's engagement to attend those cases,  
and you should see that every attention in the  
way of furnishing medical attendance is  
given them." I concluded from this that Mr Dr  
Mc Dermott was at the charge of the Dep't. In the mean  
had his regular visits to the sick of all schools,  
mostly every day. He has shown nobility and  
devotion in the fulfilment of his duties.

We have been doing more than ordinary infirmary work, we had real hospital work and we had to undergo some extra expenses. I call to the fairness of the department to help us to solve our expenses, at least the bill of the extra infirmaries which will amount to \$150.00.

We hope to start teaching in a few days after the washing and disinfection of the buildings is finished.

You will find enclosed the Admission papers of Ernestine O'Brien and Basil Miskibinejima. They entered on the date marked on their papers.

Three boys, who have completed their course of study last summer, asked to stay a few months more in the school to learn some more in their respective trade. - Isaiah Beauvais was a Shoemaker.

Joseph Martin applied himself to carpentry and cement work, Angus Beauvais applied himself to form work: especially to ploughing. They wish soon to be discharged, and I beg for their discharge. Ignatius Beauvais No 417: have already been discharged by the Almighty in this last degree.

No 419 Joseph Martin 16 years, St Regis entered Sept 25, 1911.  
No 387 Angus Ignatius Beauvais, 16 years, Cough manager entered October 3, 1912.

Herewith is the certificate of health of Peter Johnson. Owing to his predisposition this boy was nearly dying of the influenza, he will be too weak to attend his properly his school during this year. I would advise to discharge him too. No 416 Peter Johnson 16 years, St Regis. I suppose these boys are entitled to treatment paid by the Department.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 18th instant in which you inform the Department of the death of eight boys and eight girls at the Spanish River Industrial School as a result of the severe epidemic of Spanish influenza.

The death of these pupils is very much regretted. The Department is satisfied that every care and attention was given them by yourself and members of your staff as well as Dr. McDermott. It is hoped that the pupils are now all on a fair way to recovery and that no further deaths will occur. The class work should be resumed again as soon as the disinfection and cleaning is completed.

The expenses incurred by you in the employment of the extra infirmarians to the amount of \$150.00 will be paid and you should forward vouchers, in duplicate, properly certified, covering the expenditure to the above amount.

With reference to the request for the discharge of pupils Nos. 419, Joseph Martin and 387, Angus Ignatius Beauvais, I beg to say that enquiries are being made from the agents at St. Regis and Caughnawaga as to what disposition is to be made of these boys when they arrive home. As soon as a reply is received you will be given further instructions. The cost of their transport will be paid by the Department.

With reference to pupil No. 416, Peter Johnson, I have to acknowledge the receipt of a certificate from Dr. McDermott regarding the health of this boy and recommending that he be discharged from the school. As the parents of this boy are dead, enquiry is being made as to what arrangements can be made for his care if it is decided to return him to St. Regis. I have to request that you will be good enough to have Dr. McDermott furnish a report as to whether he considers this boy would be likely to recover if he were sent to a sanitorium. If there is a reasonable hope that he will recover his health arrangements might be made to have him placed in a sanitorium. However, before any action is taken Dr. McDermott should give a report and also state whether he considers that it would be advisable to have him sent to a sanitorium.

I have also to acknowledge the receipt of applications and certificates of health for the admission of Ernestine Corbiere and Basil Kishibinejima, and in reply I beg to say that the admission of these two children is approved. The application of Ernestine Corbiere is returned herewith as the signature of the witness has not been filled in and this should be done and the application returned to the Department. In future, the Department would like you to forward all applications for admission to the agent of the band to which the children belong for his approval before the applications are sent in to the Department.





In accordance with your instructions I visited the Spanish River Industrial School, while on my recent trip in that section.

The principal of the school was absent at the time of my visit, having gone to Little Current on business in connection with the school. His assistant, showed me through the various buildings and did everything possible to give me an insight into their work and method of handling their pupils.

In visiting the boys' dormitory I found that the beds were well provided with bedding and although it was in the latter part of the week when I made my visit, the bed clothing was clean. Considerable difficulty is found in keeping some of the beds in proper condition on account of bed wetting by some of the smaller boys. Rubber sheets are used on these beds but the quality of rubber sheeting was very poor and thin. The greater part of the beds were not made up at the time I saw them, about ten a.m. The Asst. Principal explained that this was on account of the necessity of airing the beds.

The boys are provided with plain but warm clothing and have a change of underwear every week. They sleep in their underwear. All the boys get a bath once a week and their heads are kept close cropped.

Their food consists of, for breakfast porridge, milk, bread and butter; dinner, meat, potatoes, bread; on Fridays they have macaroni instead of meat; for supper beans or corn porridge, bread and tea or milk. Butter is given only once a day. The bread is a sort of black bread made from a formula obtained from some medical man who is known to them. It is objected to by the pupils, some of whom say that they cannot eat it at all.

The boys take turns at the outside work. Seven or eight are required for milking. Four work at shoe making and repairing. Three work at carpentering. In summer some work in the garden and four or five on the farm. The work is done during one hour after breakfast and one hour before supper. I do not think that any are overworked. The older boys help with the thrashing.

The school location does not appear to me to be a good one from a health standpoint. It is low and boggy. Land that has been cleared for some time is still very boggy. In the mornings there is always a mist hanging over the place. It seems to me to be about the worst possible location for any person who is at all subject to tubercular troubles of any kind.

2.

I found the girl's school to be in much better condition than the boys'. The building is a better one and is kept much cleaner. The location, however, has the same fault as that of the other school, both being built on the low land down near the lake.

I noticed, when passing the cemetery that there appeared to be quite a number of graves. By looking over the fence I could count over 60 graves and there were probably some others which I could not see on account of the tall grass. That seems to be a great many for such a short time as the school has been in existence.

I saw the Simon boys and they appeared to be in good health and not suffering from being underfed. I asked them if they wanted to leave the school and they said not. They may have been influenced by the presence of the teacher at the time.

From what I saw, while at the school, I would consider that its unsanitary location was the greatest fault. It seems to me that there is bound to be sickness on this account. The food provided, while plain enough of great variety, is not stinted in quantity. The only complaint in regard to quality might be in the matter of the bread. The clothing provided is sufficient and cleanliness of body is well looked after.

Some complaint has been made by the parents as to the quality of the food supplied at this school, and I shall be pleased if you will have this loaf analyzed, and let me have a report as to its food value.

The nutritive value (1188 calories per lb) is about the average though the protein and fibre are slightly higher than usual. This is probably due to the use of a flour containing more of the bran, though otherwise it is just as nutritious as a finer flour. The acidity and taste indicate that the bread is slightly sour, but the analysis does not indicate that the bread should cause ill health.

Rev. and Dear Sir,

As you are aware, the Department received some complaints as to the quality of the bread that was being furnished the pupils of the Spanish River Industrial school, and Mr. Phelan was requested, when he visited the institution, to bring home with him a sample loaf which you were kind enough to give to him.

The loaf was submitted to the Chief Government Analyst, of the Department of Trade and Commerce, and I think I cannot do better than to enclose herewith a copy of the report received.

One of the claims made to the Department was that the bread was very often sour. You will notice that the report of the Analyst shows that, while the nutritive value of the sample sent in is about the average, there was evidence of sourness.

As bread is one of the staple articles of diet — in all institutions of this kind the greatest care should be taken to see that only that of the best quality is furnished the children. I am sure that you will exercise the necessary care to see that the wishes of the Department in this respect are carried out.

If the Deptt. think that we should give the children  
pure white bread only I am ready to give it to them: it  
was not a question of economy that prompted us to give them  
brown bread; but a question of health. Practically there is no  
economy as children eat more of the brown than if the pure  
white bread. I can say that I have never heard a boy or  
a girl complain about the latter. They prefer the former to the  
latter. I can also say that to my knowledge we never gave  
our bread to the children.

More money is not the Chief Government Budget when the budget  
of the half of bread was brought. We never give to the children,  
nor to the staff any brown bread more than three or four  
days old; because we know that on account of the bran,  
especially, their bread becomes sour in a short time.

Therefore I would be glad to know when the analysis was made, i.e. begun, as this may explain why it was found slightly sober. Your letter induces me to think that there are other complaints as you say that "one of the claimants to the Dept. says that the bread was very often sour."

I would be much obliged to you if you would kindly let me know of these other claims.

Dear Sir.

I acknowledge the receipt of your letter of March, 31<sup>st</sup> No. 388664 re influenza.

The answer I am very glad to say that there are only two children still in bed to-day, one boy and one girl, and both are expected to be up in a few days.

During the month of March there were 62 cases treated in the infirmary. Fortunately the attack of influenza was not severe: much coughing, but little fever. After three or four days they were better. None relapsed. Those who had a beginning of pneumonia, 8. of pneumonitis, 6, are now out with the others, but kept under special care and diet. Classes were interrupted three days in all.

After the mild winter we had and following sudden change in the temperature it was expected that some kind of disease would result. It came quite suddenly just the same; but thank God, it was not severe.

Doctor Mr. Dermott hopes that it will not be necessary to seek fulfil to Dr. Louis Pasteur for an operation. This boy is in great pain now and is doing very much better. I keep his mother well informed.


Rev. Sir,-
