

I have just received a communication from the Indian Residential School, signed J. Howitt, Director, Spanish, Que., which I enclose herewith.

As I was just preparing to have him come back, although it is a difficult matter for me at present - but I am expecting a position soon, I received a letter dated the 3<sup>rd</sup> of June informing me that my son had had a finger cut off from his principal hand, that is the right one.

I am very sorry of that, I sent my child to Spanish without any weapon, he will return here without a finger, that will be missing all through his future life.

I have no doubt that he must be seriously wounded and if such is the case I will hold you responsible at the community for having caused my child to work in a dangerous position which might have ended in his life. A child of less than 5 years can do more mischief I suppose.

Hoping this will hold a full investigation as I am constantly watching over my son and I understand as to whether the boy is seriously wounded or a finger completely off. With great good will I will not be reluctant to see my child return home, that is inevitable. I would most satisfy

Reverend Sir,-

I desire to refer to previous correspondence with reference to the discharge of Paul Henri Grosclouis from the Spanish Indian Residential School.

The Department is now in receipt of a letter from his father, stating that he has just been advised regarding the boy losing a finger on the 3rd instant. It is noted that you reported this in your letter of the 4th instant.

Please let the Department have full details regarding this accident as soon as possible. You should state how the boy was employed when it occurred, whether he was under the supervision of any member of the staff at the time and whether or not there was any carelessness on his own part. Please let me know, also, if this boy lost the whole or only part of his finger and advise his condition at the present time and when the medical officer considers he will be able to go home.




Dear Sir

In your letter 36-0-13 Feb. 7<sup>th</sup>, 1930 I read: "It is thought that in urgent cases, it might be possible to have the local medical officer make any necessary extractions" as I had two urgent cases I followed this direction by having these boys Lawrence Canadian #° 818 and Lawrence Francis #° 986 attended by a dentist Dr. G. Marshall who comes to Francis every two months. I asked the Doctor to be satisfied with one dollar for the annual filling of Lawrence Canadian and twenty five cents for the extraction of a first molar of Lawrence Francis. The work was well done and I enclose the bill of Dr. Marshall in triplicate.

Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 14th instant, requesting that dental attention be given to the pupils of the Spanish Indian Residential School.

In reply I have to say that you may arrange with Dr. W. E. Boyd, Espanola, Ont., to perform the dental work absolutely urgent at the present time. The work should be done at the school. Our funds for dental services are extremely limited, and the total expenditure incurred for this purpose at the Spanish School must not exceed the sum of \$200. Dr. Boyd will be allowed the same rates as previously paid him, viz.: \$1.00 per amalgam filling; 50¢ in the case of each extraction of permanent teeth; and 25¢ for each extraction of first teeth. In the case of first teeth, no dental attention with the exception of extraction can be allowed. Dr. Boyd is to supply all materials and he will be allowed his actual travelling expenses. I would request that the new pupils entering the school receive first consideration by the dentist.

Please have Dr. Boyd prepare a list, in triplicate, on a medical account form, stating the name of each pupil receiving attention and the number of fillings and extractions in each case. He should also state thereon the mileage travelled by him and the amount charged, which must not exceed 7¢ per mile. This account should be certified by you and forwarded to the Department for payment.

You may arrange for the carrying out of the dental work absolutely urgent at the present time. This should be done at an early date, but it should be distinctly understood that the total cost is not to exceed the amount stated above, viz.: \$200.



Dear Sir:

Doctor Boyd has written to the effect that Mrs. Dave Solomon of Spanish is to have her teeth removed and that you have authority for this procedure. The Department would be pleased if you would see that this is done. Having only the name of this woman it is somewhat difficult to trace up the authority you have received, or the band she may belong to in a district where the Indians from many bands are mixed together.

The Department is prepared to pay for the removal of this woman's teeth, and will, apparently be called upon to replace them by an artificial set. It is reluctant, however, to pay her expenses to go to the dentist, and does not wish to do so unless you find that there is no way of her going there by her own means.

Perhaps you would be good enough to endorse Doctor Boyd's account in this case, and to enter upon it the name of the band to which the woman belongs. It should go to her Indian Agent.




I had to-day Dr. Harvie's visit and we went over our requisition item by item as recommended. You may find the requisition of rubbing alcohol a little too much but Dr. Harvie thought that I used at least as much. The Department's conclusion that Indians prescribe for themselves is true to this extent that Dr. Harvie lives so far and so much out of reach for those across the river, that we give sometimes v. g. some cough medicine or liquid paraffin & oil to a subject we know from a Doctor's previous examination, meraed with appendicitis. If the Department wants us to change our policy we will do so. As you know I have instructed the Informarian to give medicine in such cases in small quantities.

Reverend Sir:

I have your letter of the 18th instant, enclosing a communication which you received from Dr. W. E. Boyd, Espanola, Ont., regarding dental attention required by the pupils of the Spanish Indian Residential School.

In this connection I have to say that you may arrange with Dr. Boyd to perform the dental work absolutely urgent at the present time for the pupils at the Boys' and Girls Schools. The Department will allow Dr. Boyd remuneration at the rate of \$30 per day and reasonable travelling expenses. The work should be performed at the school - the dentist to supply all materials. It is considered that not more than 5 days' work should be necessary at this time. The Department is now paying dentists at a per diem rate instead of, as formerly, a fee for each extraction and filling.

It is expected that the dentist will devote full time to the work while at the school, and you should assist him in having the pupils ready for treatment, in order that there will be no delay in his work.

The dentist should prepare a list, showing the name of each pupil receiving treatment and the work performed in each case. He should also prepare an account for his services at the rate mentioned. The account, with the list of work done, should be handed to you, to be certified in the usual manner and forwarded to the Department for payment.

It is noted that Dr. Boyd will be able to perform the dental work early in the new year. Our funds are extremely limited, and it is considered that five days should be sufficient to carry out all the work required by the pupils at the present time.





Dear Sir:

Some dental work is required at the Indian Residential School at Spanish. The girls have been examined recently by one of the departmental nurses, Miss B. Cousins, who finds that something in the neighbourhood of 100 fillings are likely to be required. She did not examine the boys, but I think it likely that 3 or 4 days' work will be required. The Department now allows a rate of \$30.00 per day for clinic work of this nature, plus all out of pocket expenses.

It is intended that Miss Cousins should return to Spanish at an early date, and I hope it will be possible for you to conduct the clinic when she is there to assist.

At Serpent River Reserve, which is about 8 miles north of Spanish, there are 15 or 20 children requiring dental attention. The Department is willing to authorize a one-day clinic there, with the understanding that school children shall be given the preference but that adults in urgent need of dental service should receive attention if time allows on the day set for the clinic. Miss Cousins will arrange the clinic there with the cooperation of the school teacher. I would suggest Friday, October 25th, for the work at Serpent River, and October 28th, 29th and 30th for the residential schools at Spanish.

Reverend Sir:

I am requesting Doctor Harvie to examine pupils of the Girls School who were reported by the nurse as having enlarged tonsils. It may be that some of these require operation, and possibly some of the boys require similar attention.

Miss Moodie has mentioned the excellent infirmary accommodation at Spanish, and if there are a number of pupils requiring tonsillectomy this would seem to be a favourable time to have the work done as the Department is willing to assign Miss Beatrice Cousins for full time duty at the school for a few days and also to authorize Doctor Harvie to engage a nurse from Espanola if a tonsil clinic can be arranged at Spanish. Our suggestion is that Doctor Harvie's time should be conserved by Miss Cousins making the general examination and referring cases to him for his decision. She is a very competent nurse and a good organizer, and I feel that the clinic can be arranged without disturbing school routine for any pupils save the patients, and every effort would be made to avoid disturbance of the staff.

Doctor Harvie and Miss Cousins are being requested to hold themselves in readiness to organize the suggested clinic if you have no objection. They will consult with you and Miss St. James and the final decision as to whether the clinic will be held at the Residential School or not rests with you. The suggested arrangement is, however, the only one for which funds are available at present.

I wish to make it clear that it is not necessary to consult the Department further in this connection, as the work should be done immediately, if at all, in order to take advantage of the fact that Miss Cousins is in your district.

In the report of Nurse Cousins of her examination of the girls at Spanish Residential School, 5 are mentioned as having enlarged tonsils. She did not examine the boys at the time of her first visit, but it is likely that the same report could be made about at least as many of them.

Will you please arrange to go to Spanish during the coming week, with a view to planning a tonsil clinic at the School if this is found to be necessary. It is expected that Miss Cousins will be on duty there the first three or four days of the week, as a dental clinic has been planned. We are not absolutely certain of the dates, as the details of arrangement were left to Doctor Boyd and Miss Cousins. I would suggest that you ascertain from the School authorities or Doctor Boyd when the dental work is completed, as we do not wish to impose on the good nature of the Principal by disorganizing his school routine too greatly.

I have written Reverend Father Mery, telling him that we wish to conserve your time by having Miss Cousins make the general examination of pupils and referring those requiring attention to you, on the occasion of your visit at the school. I have made it clear to him that the decision as to whether a clinic should be held at the school or not rests with him. The Department is


willing to assign Miss Cousins to full time duty for a few days, and is willing also to authorize you to engage a nurse from Espanola to remain at the School with Nurse Cousins for a few days if the clinic takes place. I presume Doctor Berry would give the anaesthetics, and it is desired that he or you should remain at the School over night as a precautionary measure.

You may not find that there are a sufficient number of pupils requiring tonsillectomy to justify the proposed clinic, in which case the idea may be dropped for the present as funds are not available to carry it out under other circumstances.

On the occasion of your preliminary visit in this connection, please examine all pupils reported as having sore eyes. Miss Cousins will be able to give you their names. I should also like to have a report from you regarding goitre in the Schools and the possibility of treatment.

The Department wishes to take advantage of Miss Cousins' presence in the district, and it is desirable that as much work as possible should be done not only for the pupils of the Residential Schools but for the Indians in all Reserves under your care.







Dear Sirs:-

In connection with the tonsil clinic recently held at the Residential School, Spanish, I wish to point out the extra effort, time and expense it meant to me.

Firstly, I made a trip and inspected some 50 prospective cases on Nov. 1st.

Secondly, I made a trip on Nov. 2nd to carry out the operations and remained on the School overnight leaving at noon on November 3rd.

Thirdly, it was necessary for Dr. Berry to take a second car in order to return to Espanola the same day as the practice was left alone all day, so this meant a trip for him to give anaesthetics.

Fourthly, I borrowed a bundle of sterilized sponges from Hospital here which were returned, borrowed all necessary instruments also McKesson suction and ether vaporizer apparatus and head light from Hospital and burned out a bulb of head light, used about 10 or 11 feet of Hospital #8 snare wire, used 3 Ethyl Chloride 100 grams tubes and  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. chloroform of my own, took my own sterilized gowns, and also took hemostatic serum, horse serum, cat-gut and linen for emergencies but were not necessary to use.

I have indicated the above as I believe you will agree it is only fair I should receive some remuneration other than the \$50.00 anaesthetic fees for Dr. Berry's services.

Dear Sir:

In reply to your letter of November 8th, the Department must point out that the salary paid you for attendance on Indians is very substantial, and in fact is paid for the very services described in that letter.

It would not pay to send any ordinary quantity of potassium citrate mixture to the school at Spanish. Presumably you have such supplies, and the Department would be pleased if you would furnish the quantity required for present use. You may charge this to the Department by sending a voucher or account to the principal of the Residential School, and see that the necessary drugs are included in the next requisition.



Dear Sirs:-

I have your letter of Oct. 26/35 No. 36-0-13D and carried out your requests.

I visited the Spanish Residential School on Nov. 1st. and made arrangements for a tonsil clinic the following day Nov. 2nd. On Nov. 2nd we performed ten tonsillectomies on 6 boys & 4 girls in the Girls' Infirmary. There are still remaining about 35 cases that some day would be the better for being done. I remained at the School overnight as requested. In fact, I was at the School Nov. 1st, 2nd, 3rd., 6th, and 7th, so far this month.

I examined 18 cases of sore eyes Miss Cousins had picked out and I believe found 2 positive cases of trachoma amongst the boys and 10 other suspicious ones and 6 suspicious ones amongst the girls. One boy had a particularly bad eye and I thought it better to isolate him from the rest to see how he responds to treatment and to await word from the Department as to whether you wish anything further done. His eye was discharging considerably, his lids were acutely congested and he had a history of possible trachoma in the family. We have instituted treatment for all eighteen. The ~~boy's~~ boys' school does not seem to have the necessary supplies so I suggested they borrow sufficient from the Girls' School until the Department have time to send some to them.

There are about 50 cases of enlarged thyroid in each school and I have suggested that each school requisition for 5000 Sodium Iodide tablets on arrival of which we will commence treatment for them. Sometime ago I had the Girls' School ~~requisition~~ requisition for them but the Department at that time replied that they did not supply them but I hope you will now.

I would like to pass a few remarks re Miss Cousins'



work. She performed a wonderful job in my opinion and I believe got every cooperation. She is capable, diplomatic and untiring in her efforts and I believe her work will stimulate further cooperation interest and resultant good in the treatment of Indians. If it could be arranged that a girl of her type could visit and inspect the Reserves and School here annually, I am sure it would meet with fruitful results.

While on this point I would like to suggest that the Department notify us in advance should an inspection take place again in order that we can arrange our work so that we can lend every cooperation.

Reverend Sir:

This will be your authority to arrange for a dental clinic at the Spanish Indian Residential School. The work is to be offered to Doctor W. E. Boyd, of Espanola, and the fee allowed is \$30.00 per day, the dentist to provide his own materials for extractions and simple fillings. A maximum of six days' work is authorized by this letter. If this does not nearly cover the requirements it might be possible to have another clinic in the fall. Probably you will not wish to have more than this number of days done at the present time.

Doctor Boyd may be allowed actual return railway fare from Espanola to Spanish to compensate him for his outlay in travelling. It is assumed that he will be accommodated at the school without charge.

His account should be presented in the manner usual to Doctors and dentists and on the correct stationery. It is not necessary that the account should contain the names of pupils treated, but the number of fillings and extractions must be given. You will wish to keep a record of the work done for each pupil.

The Department anticipates that good work will be done and, from experience in other places, has come to expect rather a long day's work at these





There has been considerable discussion of the services and compensation of Doctors Harvie and Langlois at Espanola and Blind River respectively. Doctor Harvie receives a salary of \$2000. per annum for attendance on the Spanish River and Serpent River Reserves and at the Indian Residential School. It is not found that he has rendered any accounts for extra services to these people but he has rendered some accounts for work done for Indians not belonging to any of these groups. Doctor Langlois receives \$600. for attendance at Blind River and he has rendered many accounts for other Indians including some for those of Serpent River.

It was, without doubt, the Department's intention that the salaries paid these two doctors should cover all professional services rendered by them to Indians and the Department means to adhere to this intention both as regards accounts which may now be unpaid and as regards the future. Kindly communicate this information to the doctors concerned.

In reply to your letter of November 12th, I may say that the Department wishes as you do to avoid an outbreak of diphtheria at the school under your charge. You do not say, however, whether the proposed measure is inoculation with diphtheria antitoxin as a temporary measure, or treatment by toxoid as a permanent protection. The latter is preferable, for obvious reasons, if there is no apparent immediate danger.

This is a matter to be taken up with Doctor Harvie, but not for further correspondence. He will scarcely expect an additional fee for the work, and he can procure the necessary materials. If so asked, you may accept an account from the Provincial Government or other usual source of supply.

I was glad to receive your letter re your patient.

Your mastoid case is apparently better. I would continue with the same treatment and if no better or condition becomes worse you might send her here as I think perhaps we could deal with it.

I am of the opinion you should order 1000 Sulphonamide (~~B.W.~~) tablets and have on hand for such cases as Catherine Keiamesens. She should take 2 or 3 a day for a week or 10 days. Another thing you ~~mix~~ might give her is Stannoxyd tablets one 3 times a day after meals.

You are doing everything possible for Agatha Jacobs except scarlet fever anti-toxin or erysipelus vaccine. You might give her the latter should she not show improvement shortly. I think I would give her the aspirin and if her pulse is over 110 some preparation of Digitalis.







In acknowledgement of your letter of the 20th instant, reporting the gravity of the illness of Isaac Thompson, I wish to state that the suggestion to send the body home, if the boy should die, has received sympathetic consideration. I have to point out, however, that it is not the practice of the Department to send bodies of Indians by rail excepting under very exceptional circumstances. Bodies so shipped have to be properly prepared by the undertakers for transhipment under the laws of the province, and the expense of a long journey, such as this would be, would entail an expenditure which the Department does not feel warranted in authorizing.


I had the visit to day of Paul Henry Grosleuis, who until some five years back resided with his father in Montreal. At that time his father died, and being an orphan, on his father's and mother's side, he has more or less lived the life of trying to make his own living, which he has succeeded to the best of his ability, staying most of these years in the United States of America; consequently has done what most of the Indians don't by looking after himself, without the Department's help.

He is yet a poor man at that, and married in Los Angeles, Calif and has been a sailor aboard steamships. Now here's the object of this letter. In 1930 your Department sent him to St Peter Claver Indian School at Spanish, Ont, where he resided two years, or until July 1932, where he met with an accident, losing one whole finger and joint, the index in the right hand, while working in the saw mill. After being discharged from the Hospital he was sent back home to Montreal, where his father placed a complaint, intending to sue for damages.

At the time, I understand your Department asked the father to hold this until the boy was fully of age, meaning the twenty one year mark.

You had his visit last week, and according to his statement, you referred him to his own agency, to take this matter up from here. This man claims he is entitled to some damages, as it has lost a number of jobs for him, and wants you to allow him a decent amount at once, so he can move back to his wife and kids. I would be obliged, if you would give this letter quick consideration, and advise of your intentions.

For your information I enclose copy of a letter written to this boy's father on June 18, 1932. This letter fully explains the accident and you will note that neither the school management nor the Department assumed any responsibility for it as it is quite apparent that the accident was due wholly to the boy's own carelessness.

Present regulations provide that when an Indian is 18 months away from his Reserve the municipality in which he is resident will have to be responsible for his maintenance and medical care should he become ill or indigent. This Department is not prepared to allow any relief to Paul Henry Groslouis.

Reverend Father Howitt, S.J. gave ~~the~~ letter of December 14 in answer to ours of December 12th. Out of the 70 gallons referred to in your letter, 35 went to the Boys Department and 35 to the Girls Department. Believing to follow the indications of medical authorities, the girls were served each a dessert spoon three times a day.

126 Girls take in one day 378 dessert spoonfuls

1 Gallon - 160 ounces (imperial measure)

1 Ounce contains 4 dessert spoonfuls

160 ounces (a gallon) contains 640 dessert spoonfuls

35 Gallons contains 22,400 dessert spoonfuls

22,400 Dessert spoonfuls - 378 Dessert spoonfuls, 59 days to use 35 gallons, if they do not take it during 4 or 5 days a month.

The results are good, the weight increases and the general health is good. At the T.B. clinic in April 1938 one only case has been found who needed special care. The Doctor visiting the school is pleased with the state of health of our children.

We attribute this success to the use of Cod Liver oil.

In spite of the welfare, the oil procures to the girls.

we are ready to change the way of serving it though we do not think it would be so efficacious.







We are again asking for the following articles and drugs. They were requested in June, 1941, but were never received. When Doctor Faulkner made his official visit this year, we informed him of this and he intimated that we should again make a request for them. We carefully explained to him our particular need of these items, herein listed.

It might be well to state again our need for these articles. The head band and mirror is needed to make preliminary examination of patient, before phoning doctor, who is residing 35 miles from the school. In all cases the doctor always tries to find out as much information as possible before deciding what is best to done to boy. Without the head band and mirror we are often at a lost to answer his questions.

Concerning the dental instruments our difficulty is much

the same. It is necessary for us to make the preliminary examination of the boys teeth, before making report to Dept. for visit of Dentist and moreover, we have to treat tooth aches at the school. It would be impossible as well as very costly to have to run every boy with a tooth ache to the dentist, who lives 35 miles from the school.

Our need for adhesive tape and guaze is also very great. This year we only received two rolls of 2 x 10 tape, which has already been used up. Last year we experienced the same difficulty and as a result we had to buy an addition supply. This year we have again bought an extra two rolls, which we last us for another month or two. We have also had to sew on all dressings or else tie them with sheeting. When we explained this to the Doctor, he informs us that the Dept. could buy this material cheaper than our school. Likewise for the guaze, we have to use a lot of this material, due to the fact that Indian children are often troubled with skin disease. This years supply is about used up.


This years supply of cod liver oil will last us only about  $3\frac{1}{2}$  months. Rationing out the oil to 125 boys, a case lasts us from 8 to 10 days. To get good and lasting results from the oil for the year we should start now to issue it, but if we do so, we will have used our supply before the middle of the year. We should especially give oil to the boys in the Spring as well as Fall and half the winter months. But to do this we would need at least 15 more cases. Last year we had very good results from the little supply we had on hand. But we found out we started too late and had to stop too early in the year, to enable us to obtain the very best results and less sickness. Hoping you will give this request your kindest consideration we remain,

One of our pupils, Rita Miracle, is apparently suffering from some type of mental illness, and we should like to have arrangements made for placing her in some institution where she could be given necessary attention.

This child was sent here from an orphanage at Kingston, Ont., on July 10, 1940. She is sixteen years of age. She has had no correspondence from parents or relatives since her arrival, and we have no records as to her parents, home address, etc.

She has always seemed to be of a very morose disposition. Since September

first, she has become more and  
more troublesome, until it has  
become necessary to remove her  
from contact with the other  
children. She has shown excessive  
stubbornness for about two months,  
refusing to move when told to do so, to

by some nervous disorder, as she  
does not sleep well at night, something  
most unusual for a child of her age.

This condition has gradually  
become worse, until to day, when  
she showed signs of definite insanity,  
by tearing her clothing, the bed covering,  
etc.



The information on our files indicates that this girl was born in the year 1927. She was an illegitimate child of Percilla Maracle of the Tyendinaga Reserve and was adopted by Freeman Maracle and his wife. Freeman Maracle is also a member of the Tyendinaga Band. His wife died in the spring of 1932 and he deserted the child in August of that year. At that time she was placed in St. Mary's of the Lake Orphanage, Kingston, Ont., as the Indian Agent stated that she was a Catholic.

She remained there until July of 1940 at which time she was transferred to the Spanish Residential School.



It will be in order to arrange with Dr. Boyd to hold a dental clinic, not to exceed four days at the Spanish school. The Department will pay the usual \$30 a day, the dentist to supply his own equipment and materials.

It is thought that the regular medical attendant of the school could probably arrange to be present when Doctor Boyd is holding the clinic so that he could give the anaesthetics where patients require them. It is also thought probable that the medical attendant could carry out a number of the extractions that are necessary.

Dear Doctor Moore,

Doctor Hamill of Blind River has recommended that Charlotte Lazare, No. C983, see a specialist as she has small tumors in each of her nostrils. I understand he suggested Sudbury.

Doctor Hamill is going to operate on the tonsils of two of the children at the Girls' School this week. He will do the operations at Blind River. The two children are No. C1106 Lillian Solomon and No. C1147 Annie Corbiere.

I have received the reports of the X-rays taken by the Travelling Chest Clinic. They recommended hospitalisation of one child, Agnet Solomon, but it apparently is an error as the child is quite alright--Dr. Hamill examined her yesterday evening. I believe Dr. Hamill is writing in regard to this matter. The report recommends that one of the boys be re-x-rayed in six weeks--the diagnosis was probable pneumonia at left base. It is recommended that another boy be re-x-rayed in 3-4 months, and that three of the girls and two of the boys be re-x-rayed in six months. Will you kindly advise your wishes in this regard.

Reverend Sir:

I wish to acknowledge your letter of March 24 with enclosed account for \$29.27.

With reference to Holly Rice, the school term will soon be over and on her return to the Reserve at Caughnawaga we can have her examined by our medical officer there.

Regarding the account we would like further information on several items before approving payment.

Upon whose authority was a nurse hired to attend the dental clinic? It is not the custom of this Department to arrange a contract with a dentist to do certain work and then pay for a nurse's services as well. Medical supplies are sent out from the Department for use in the dispensary. If certain medicines are not available in this stock, the Department will pay for what is required on the prescription of the doctor in charge, a copy of the prescription must be forwarded with the account from the drug store.

There is a total of \$9.12 for lenses for Leonard Cross. Was this authorized? Regulations state authority must be obtained from Ottawa. The Department cannot approve of paying for spectacle cases at 50¢ a piece when we obtain and maintain a stock of them here at 6¢ each.

On receipt of this information further consideration will be given the account, but it is emphasized that

Dear Sir,

It is discouraging enough to be denied a regular medical attendant but when we are refused even the necessary medical supplies, the situation becomes impossible. The Medical Services know full well that we have no regular medical attendant and yet they do not even acknowledge our request of March 19th for necessary medical supplies. Apparently they do not appreciate even the effort we have made to carry on without a regular doctor--or the effort we have made to keep down expenses--a very discouraging attitude, to say the least. Let them try to take care of 126 active boys and see how far they can go without medical supplies. If they are not concerned about first aid and medical care for them, we are. And we are quite concerned that none of the children entrusted to our care die because of their not receiving proper care or care in time. If the Medical Services prefer to pay hospital bills, we are ready to send all sick to the hospital.

The Department authorized glasses for the children last year and finally sent the glasses--without cases. Anyone would know how long glasses would remain unbroken if given to live boys without cases. The Department included a note with the glasses to the effect that cases could not be procured. I took the trouble to search around until I found an oculist kind enough to let me have a dozen cases. The Department then refuse to pay for them because they--the Department--"obtain and maintain a stock of them .... at 6¢ each". ( Cf. Letter of W.L. Falconer, M.D., File 36-0-13, April 1, 1943.) Somehow it sounds rather contradictory to me.

One of the boys broke his glasses twice and had to have them repaired. The Department--in the same letter mentioned above--ask if this was authorized. Perhaps they will state whether their initial authorization for the child to wear glasses meant for him to wear them only until they were broken, or did the authorization mean that they considered that the child should wear glasses until the eye condition was corrected, if possible. The lad actually had about 10% vision in one eye and 30% in the other.

(over)

In the same letter, the writer states that medical supplies are sent out from the Department for use in the dispensary. Their disregard of our request for supplies needed does not carry out this statement.

The Department authorized a Dental Clinic last Fall. Before the Clinic began, our infirmarian was obliged to go to the hospital as a patient--he was 17 days in the hospital--due to a blood infection contracted while treating infected cases among the pupils. The Dental Clinic was during his stay in the hospital. I myself looked after the regular infirmary treatments and the sick during those 17 days--and it saved the doctor more than one call. But I could not remain with the Dentist all day long during his clinic which he held during that time. Someone had to assist. I called upon a nurse. I did not call upon the Department to pay for our infirmarian's hospital expenses etc., though the infection was due to his devoting himself to the work of the Department. But I did submit a claim for the fee paid to the nurse. It was not allowed. Instead the reply abruptly demanded upon whose authority a nurse was hired! The more one does apparently, the less thanks one receives.

I asked that something be done in regard to one of the pupils at the Girls' School, who appears to be somewhat mental. The writer in the same letter already referred to dismissed the request with a summary reply that the school term would soon be over and on her return to the Reserve at Caughnawaga she could be examined by your medical officer there. At the time of writing, there still remained three months of the school term. And though the child originally came from Caughnawaga, I mentioned in my letter that the mother of the child was in a mental institution. The child has no home there now. The father, I am told, is somewhere in the States. Caughnawaga children never go back to the Reserve for the summer holidays--they remain here until they are discharged by the Department and then return to the Reserve if they have a home and a suitable one. The Medical Services might give our requests credit for having been thought upon a little bit before being made and for taking into consideration various circumstances surrounding and affecting the individual cases.

Our relations with the officers of the Welfare and Training Divisions have always been so cordial and pleasant and an encouragement to cooperation. It is with deepest regret that I write this letter in respect to our relations with the Medical Services. For two months I could not bring myself to discuss their letter of April 1st. But I can no longer hesitate to write as something must be done in regard to our medical situation, and the disregard of our request for supplies that are needed if we are to carry on. I leave the matter in your hands.



Reverend Sir:

In acknowledgement of your letter of the 20th instant, reporting the gravity of the illness of Isaac Thompson, I wish to state that the suggestion to send the body home, if the boy should die, has received sympathetic consideration. I have to point out, however, that it is not the practice of the Department to send bodies of Indians by rail excepting under very exceptional circumstances. Bodies so shipped have to be properly prepared by the undertakers for transhipment under the laws of the province, and the expense of a long journey, such as this would be, would entail an expenditure which the Department does not feel warranted in authorising.
