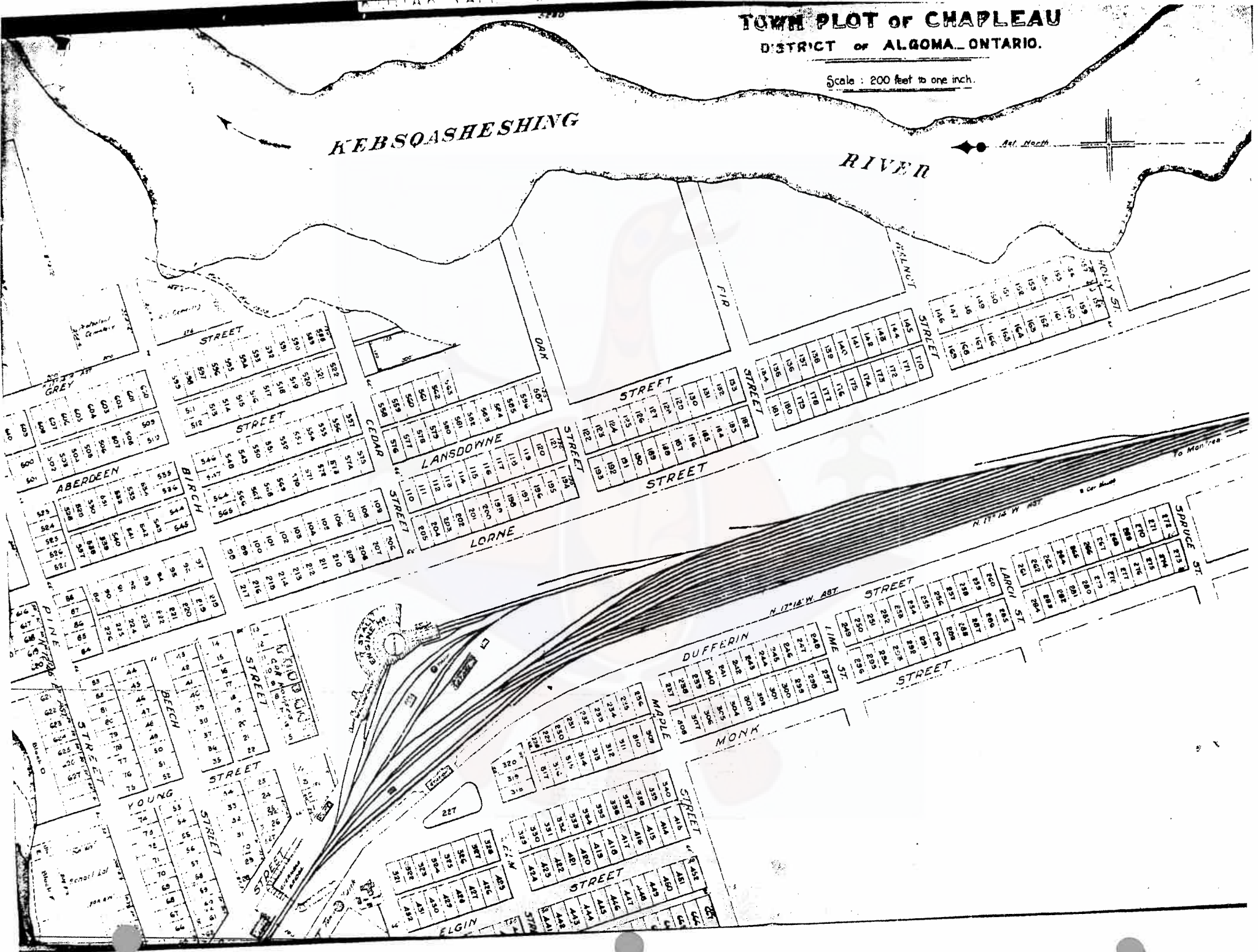
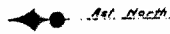
TOWN PLOT of CHAPLEAU

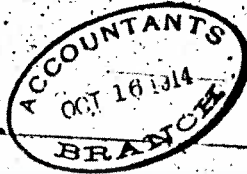



Dear Sir:-

On the road partly constructed and leading to the clearing done on the site chosen for the erection of the proposed new Boarding School, in the summer of 1914, is several yards of corduroy necessary in crossing a piece of heavy muskeg. This part, I believe, was intended to have been covered with gravel or earth of some kind.

Through this neglect and due to exposure to the weather, a number of the cross pieces have become rotten and as a result the whole crossing has become loose and is a great menace to our stock and horses which go in this direction to find pasture during the summer months.

Last summer one of our work horses, in crossing got his leg through an opening and hurt himself to such an extent that we were unable to work him for some time. It is in such a condition now that we dare not cross with a wagon. The material used was principally spruce, which does not retain its virtue for much more than three or four years when used for purposes of this kind.

I would be very glad if the Department would give me permission to remove this off the road. I think there will be sufficient wood found on the place to repay us for the work of clearing it away, so that all that is asked for is permission to clear it away. I think we can do this as soon as our planting is done and the road becomes dry enough to work on.

Further to conversation I had with you re Indian schools, principally the Indian school at Chapleau, the situation briefly is this; that the Department must at once, or at a very early date at least, come to the relief of these schools in a greater degree than has been done in the past, or such of the schools as cannot command outside support will have to be closed. Why do I say this? For the plain reason that after careful personal investigation, I have convinced myself, and I believe that I can convince anyone else who will take the trouble to go into the matter carefully, that the schools cannot be efficiently maintained on the present scale of remuneration. It is not necessary that I should belabour this point. It is a plain fact that must be faced. What does this mean at the moment? The Indian schools have been built up. I will take the Chapleau school as a practical illustration:

The Indians have sent their children there. They have come to look upon the school as a fixture, something to which they could look forward to as a means of getting the rising generation of Indian men and women into a position that would enable them to compete, at least on a reasonably equal basis, with the white men who are gradually forcing them whether they like it or not, into the white man's environment. On top of this comes the condition arising out of the influenza epidemic, and without entering into the details I feel that your records will show that in every district of which an Indian school forms a center, it will be found that there are in some cases hundreds of

Indians are left complete orphans, and in many cases, destitute. I can give you specific instances of families of Indian children whose father went Overseas and in whose absence the mother had died, the children now being cared for by other Indian families who have all their own problems to confront. It may be said that these children can be cared for by moving them out of the country altogether, but it matters not where they are, they must be cared for or abandoned to such charity as their case will command. I do not think that when once the case is properly understood, the Government will agree to either of these. In the first instance, it is not practical to move the children out. They will, in so far as they are able, refuse to go, and I do not think we can be very much surprised at that. In the second instance, we owe the Indian something better, particularly in view of the splendid record made when the manhood of Canada was called upon to do its part in the recent war. It just narrows itself down to this, that the Indian school is an absolute necessity if we are going to fulfill our common obligation to these people.

Then coming again to the school at Chapleau. The present building and equipment was provided as you are aware by the Anglican Diocese of Moosonee, the department taking the school over and re-imbursing the Diocese for the money spent. The building was intended to accommodate twenty to twenty-four children, but was really only taking care of about sixteen. By the erection of a kitchen and the use of an outside room for a schoolroom with a dormitory upstairs, it has been possible to increase the number to about forty-five or six. The whole plant, however, has been recognized as entirely inadequate to meet the needs of the situation, and as far back as I think 1912, your Department had plans prepared and, I believe, all

appropriations made for the new school. The outbreak of war held this up, and in the meantime, in order that he might as far as in him lay meet the situation and relieve the Department from unnecessary expense, the man in charge of the school with his wife have literally worked like slaves. That their work has been splendidly efficient having in mind the difficulties under which they labored, no one who has any knowledge of the situation will attempt to deny.

The war now is over, pressing problems of every description are upon us and must be met, and in my judgment this is one of the most pressing, and I take the liberty of urging you as strongly as I am able to take steps at the earliest possible moment to go ahead with the erection of that building. As pointed out to you, I am satisfied that the site originally suggested for the new school is unsuitable. The two things vitally essential is a good tract of arable land and the possibility for a first class supply of water. The next two things, possibly less essential, are convenience of access and the possibility for an efficient lighting system. In every one of these four ways the site originally selected fails to qualify. That, however, is only a minor detail and can without difficulty be easily overcome as there is an option of more than one first class site available.

Now coming to the school at Spanish. As I think you know, I am not conversant with all the details in connection with this, but I know that it has to do with the question of per-capita remuneration, and I again urge that this be given your full consideration.



With further reference to the proposed new Boarding School here,

I would like to say that it has occurred to me that about the time matters have been arranged and everything in readiness where your Department is concerned that both myself and Mr Indian Agent Godfrey might be out of town, as I usually take the month of July for my travels into the North Country, and Mr Godfrey will also be absent on his annual Treaty payments.

Mr Nicholson spoke some time ago of someone being sent up for the purpose of making a final selection of a building site.

There was a strong feeling that the site, ^{chosen in 1914} from the point of its in-possibility, owing to the distance from town and the swampy nature of the country through which the road would have to run, was not just the best location. Both the Bishop and Mr. Nicholson have favoured building at what is known as "The Old Mill Site" on the South side of the Railway and just at the East Whittle Board out of Chapleau. Mr Austin, who owns this property, is willing to let us have 25 acres there for this purpose.

However, we have been doing a good deal of clearing of the land at the present old School site and since having had the brush burned and the land cleared of stumps there is a place which rather appeals to me as a very suitable place to erect the building. It has many advantages over a new site as there is an excellent road to it and a goodly number of our old buildings could be utilized. I would particularly like Mr Ogilvy to look into the merits of this proposition.

I should very much like if some one could be sent up before the end of June. Trusting that this suggestion may receive your kind consideration.

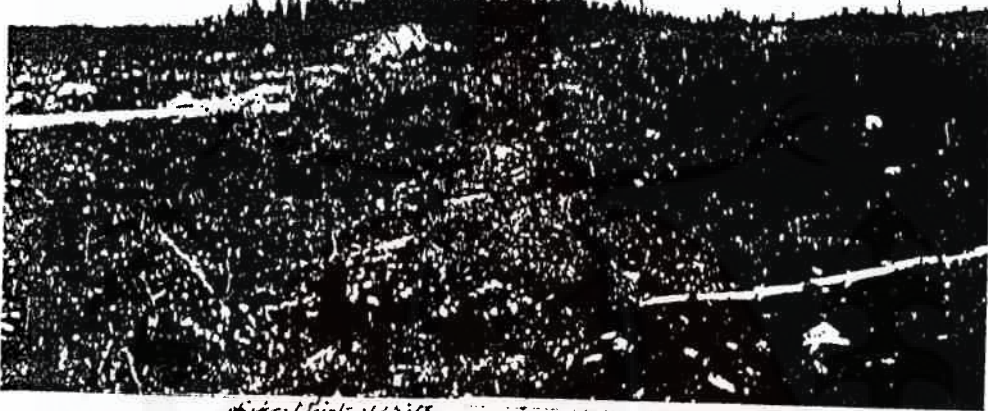

Memorandum:

As instructed I proceeded on the 28th ultimo to Chapleau for the purpose of inspecting an additional site proposed for the Indian Boarding School, and on the 27th and 28th ultimo accompanied by Mr. Prewer, Mr. Godfrey and Mr. Fife, of the electric plant, made a thorough inspection of the site offered.

The Austin site has many advantages in situation over that previously chosen, there being a fairly good road leading direct from the town to the old mill site (Austin site) and electric power plant, and on which (I am informed) the corporation of Chapleau will expend \$600.00, putting this road in a thorough state of repair.

The power line also passes along this roadway at a corner of the site of 25 acres which Mr. Austin proposes to sell to the Department at a nominal price of \$500.00. There are adequate facilities for drainage and water supply, also an abandoned railway siding into the property which if replaced would greatly facilitate the placing of materials for the building.

The site of 25 acres possessing all of the advantages stated, would be valueless for the purpose of a school, however, unless additional arable land of sufficient area can be acquired for farming purposes. Mr. Fife, representing Mr. Austin, expressed the opinion that Plot "B", containing about 320 acres, could be obtained from him for a nominal sum (exclusive of the water power site) but from a communication received this morning it would appear that he does not now wish to dispose of this plot situated between the proposed 25 acre site and the adjoining Crown lands which could be obtained.

There is, however, a lot contiguous to the 25 acres which might be available, having (so I am informed) been squatted on by an Austrian who is now in the penitentiary under a sentence of six years, and for which the Crown might on application be disposed to allot this land for a school site on payment for the improvements, totaling probably \$1000.00 to \$1500.00. This site is also on the main road to Chapleau on power line, and adjoins the site procured in 1914 and Indian Reserve, but on the west side of the river Keksquashing, as shown on the accompanying sketch.

The 25 acre site with its many advantages is preferable, providing adjoining land can be reasonably obtained, and I would recommend for your consideration that Mr. Austin be at once communicated with and this determined; also that application be made to the Provincial Crown Lands Department for Lot Number 3, Concession 5, Chapleau, (Austrian Lot) and 3 and 4 Concession 3, and 3 and 4 Concession 4, and in the event of this Plot "B" or lot 3, Concession 5 not being obtained, that the building be erected on the site procured in 1914 for that purpose.

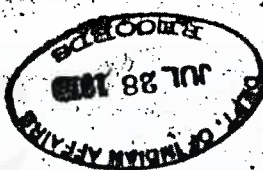

Dear Sir:-

The Good Roads Association of Ontario are making certain grants towards the opening up and repairing the roads and streets to the Incorporated Municipality of Chapleau, and knowing that it was the intention of the Department to build at what is known as the "Old Mill Site" I applied to the Council for financial aid towards the building of the road in that direction. They have agreed to, and appropriated \$600.00. for this subject, and we think that, in material and labour we can get others that have interests in that direction to consent to give another \$200.00.

As Your Mr R.M. Odlvy can advise you, the road is somewhere between a mile and a mile and a half. Is practically a winding trail over boulders rock and marsh. It was evidently used for the purpose of connection with the town when the mill was in operation, though a Switch and siding from the main line of Railway did all the heavy work.

We estimate that the cost of putting the road through, if it is to be put in anything like shape for wagons to pass over, at the present cost of labour will not be less than \$1600.00.

The Council has asked me to oversee this work and are placing the amount appropriated at my disposal. I expect to have men and teams start at the work within a day or two.

Would the Department consent to an expenditure, not exceeding \$800.00. The Good Roads Association of Ontario are making certain grants towards the opening up and repairing the roads and streets to the Incorporated Municipality of Chapleau, and knowing that it was the intention of the Department to build at what is known as the "Old Mill Site" I applied to the Council for financial aid towards the building of the road in that direction. They have agreed to, and appropriated \$600.00. for this object, and we think that, in material and labour we can get others that have interests in that direction to consent to give another \$200.00.

As Your Mr R.M. Ogilvy can advise you, the road in question between a mile and a mile and a half. Is practically a winding trail over boulders rock and marsh. It was evidently used for the purpose of connection with the town when the mill was in operation, though a Switch and siding from the main line of Railway did all the heavy work.

We estimate that the cost of putting the road through, if it is to be put in anything like shape for wagons to pass over, at the present cost of labour will not be less than \$1600.00.

The Council has asked me to oversee this work and are placing the amount appropriated at my disposal. I expect to have men and teams start at the work within a day or two.

Would the Department consent to an expenditure, not exceeding \$800.00. Both myself and Mr Indian Agent Godfrey agree that the method will be a very easy one for securing a fairly good road and we think if the appropriation is made so as to keep the men and teams together when assembled all could be in readiness when the road is needed for hauling building supplies for the erection of the building.



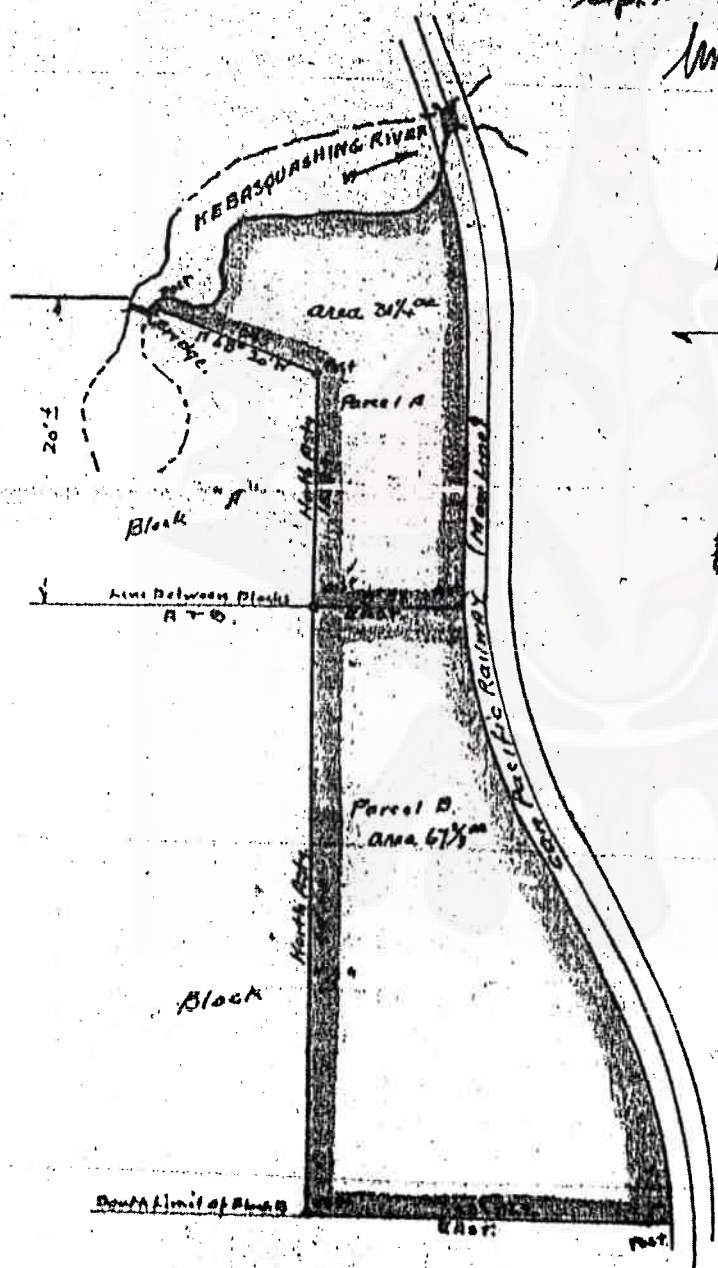



A request is being made by Rev. George Prewer of Chapleau asking that an amount of \$800.00 be granted by this Department to assist in the building of a road on a distance of about $\frac{1}{2}$ mile which leads to the Old Mill Site where it is proposed to build the new Indian school. Mr. Prewer states that an amount of \$800.00 has already been appropriated by the Ontario Provincial Government and other interested parties such as the settlers, etc., to carry out this improvement.

This road is reported, by Mr. Ogilvie who has lately visited this reserve, to be in a fairly good condition and I do not see any reasons for the Department to provide half of the expenditure it being not on Indian Reserve. But in view of the fact that it would benefit the school to a certain extent I would recommend that an amount of \$200.00 be granted as the Department share if funds are available in similar cases.

When Mr. Oglvie, of The Department was here going over the New School Site he also inspected the road going to the site, and considered the road in very bad condition and told me if I could get some money from the Province, that the Department would also spend some money on it to put it in good shape.

I have secured \$600. from the Ontario Government, and this money has already been spent on this road but it is far from being a road and I beg leave to ask the Department for a grant of \$500. to complete this work and \$300. to complete a new road from the new school site across the 25 acres connecting up the property across Lot B. to the place where Mr. Oglvie, selected as the place where all the material would be unloaded from the cars for the new school and which would save a two mile haul by teams making the haul about a third of a mile instead.

Mr. Oglvie, will be able to explain the situation and will know best what is wanted and if I were given the authority to go ahead with the work I could secure the men, teams, and outfit who have just finished up their allowance on this portion and have them complete the work and the road would be in readiness when the work is started on the new school.

I might mention that the men and teams who are employed on the road work now will soon be leaving for the lumber woods and if the work is to be done it should be started as soon as possible.

Plans and specifications were prepared, and tenders requested by advertisement in the newspapers circulating in that district for an Indian boarding school at Chapleau, Ont. Four tenders have been received, viz. :-

Rigby & Colson, Ltd., St. Catharines, Ont.,	\$144,813.00,
Wallace & Angus, North Bay, Ont.,	94,158.00,
J. A. Bernie, Chapleau, Ont.,	98,000.00,
Gustiana & Zettler, Copper Cliff, Ont.,	89,000.00.

The tender of Gustiana & Zettler and Wallace & Angus were accompanied by the necessary deposit security.

Rigby & Colson wired the Department on September 20, asking to have their tender withdrawn, but were willing to undertake the work on a percentage basis, and stated that a marked cheque would be forwarded under the above conditions.

The plans and specifications on which these tenders were based are the same as those used for the Alberni building. The lowest tender received for the Alberni building was from Messrs. Parfitt Brothers, Limited, Victoria, for \$66,848.00, and this has been accepted.

I cannot recommend the acceptance of any of the above tenders, as I think the prices are prohibitive. We called for tenders for practically the same building in August, 1914, and the lowest received was from Messrs. Woolbrick & Thornton, Sault Ste. Marie, for \$45,050.00, but, as they failed to send their deposit security, and were thus disqualified, the next, from Messrs. Sherwood & Sherwood, Toronto, for \$45,225.00, would have been the lowest.

I consider it absolutely necessary to have a new building for that school, and am disappointed at the results of the competition, but I can only take the view that it would not be proper to accept any of the present tenders, nor could I recommend the construction of the building on a percentage basis, as suggested by Messrs. Rigby & Colson.

MEMORANDUM

Hon. Mr. Meighen -

Re Chapleau School.

I had an interview with Mr. G. B. Nicholson, M.P., during which we discussed very fully the tenders received for the Chapleau school. Mr. Nicholson is of the opinion that we will not gain anything by refusing to accept the lowest tender and asking for new tenders in the spring. It is his opinion that the price of building supplies will not have decreased, and that it is not at all likely that we will get a lower tender for this work.

There is no doubt that the building is absolutely necessary and I am anxious to arrange for its erection. We have provided \$60,000.00 for this purpose in the current year's estimates. A small portion of that might be used before the close of the fiscal year, but it will probably be necessary to provide in next year's estimates for the whole amount of the contract, namely \$89,000.00. If it is at all possible to obtain this money I would recommend that the lowest tender be accepted.

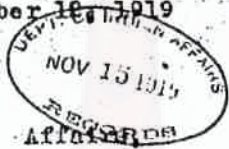

Memorandum, -

In connection with the completion of the purchase of the site for the school at Chapleau, the present position appears to be that in the case of Block "A", transfer can be made at once of that part required by this Department. Title to Block "B" however has not yet been granted by the Province to Mr. Austin.

The Department of Lands, Forests and Mines states that Mr. Austin is not a bonafide settler and that application can be made by this Department for Block "B" and grant obtained direct.

Mr. Nicholson suggests two courses, - either that this Department obtain Title to Block "B" from the Province and arrange with Mr. Austin to convey to him that part not required and presumably pay to him the price agreed upon for that part retained; or to have the Province issue patent to Mr. Austin and obtain transfer from him in the usual way. Mr. Nicholson appears to consider the first method to be the most expeditious and it would apparently be the one in which this Department is more fully protected. This would not however interfere with the immediate transfer of that part situated in Block "A".

Correspondence indicates that the actual site of the school is on Block "A" and this procedure would be the quickest method of acquiring a grant on which to commence building; the transaction involving Block "B" can then be completed in the manner most suitable to the Province. There does not appear to be any objection to the Title to the property required being covered by two separate patents.

(Area as originally intended approx 150 acres. Area as surveyed 98.71 acres. 113.76 acres in Block A, 67.75 acres in Block B)

The file does not show that a reduction in price on account of a smaller area being obtained, has as yet been agreed upon. The amount of reduction in area is from one-fifth to one-third of the total which it was expected to acquire and the reduction in price, therefore, should be at least \$200.00.

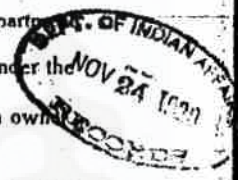

Dear Mr. Nicholson,-

I note in your letter of the 18th instant that the executors of the estate of the late J. McN. Austin have advised you that payment has not been received for the lands at Chapleau purchased by the Department from Mr. Austin. I have to inform you that payment for that portion of Block A, acquired from Mr. Austin, was made by Departmental cheque for \$500.00, issued in March 1920 and forwarded to Messrs. McKessock and Miller, Barristers, Sudbury.

You will remember at the time this purchase was first considered it was proposed that Mr. Austin would transfer to the Department an area of approximately 150 acres in Block A and Block B and that when the survey was made, it was found that the area amounted to less than 100 acres. When this matter was brought to your attention, in my letter of the 22nd October 1919, in which I suggested a reduction in the original price on this account, you replied that the question of a reduction of value would be taken up with Mr. Austin at once. Before anything was agreed upon, however, it was found that the Department of Lands, Toronto, did not regard Mr. Austin as the owner of Block B and later, the parcel required by the Department in Block B was acquired direct from the Province, by the payment of \$1.00 per acre for the area taken.

In view of the above, it would not appear that the Department could be expected to pay for the portion required in Block B in accordance with the original understanding, but if in your opinion there still remains a payment which should be made by the Department, I would be pleased to have your views in the matter.

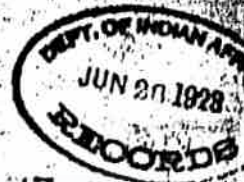

Dear Sir:-

I write you regarding the buildings over at the old school site here.

Since they have fallen into disuse, for teaching purposes they have more or less deteriorated, through decay and the destruction wrought upon them by wanton hands.

After our removal to the new site, and during my Principalship, I aimed at keeping a close watch upon these buildings and upon one occasion had some young lads brought before the Police Magistrate for destroying the property and taking away articles left in the cottage. There were, however, several instances where we could not discover who was responsible for the destruction committed.

On one or two occasions Mr Indian Agent Godfrey and myself attempted to ascertain the cost of removing the cottage to the new site, but we found that it would cost more to do this than to erect an entirely new building. To tear these buildings down, at the present cost of labour would mean that one would scarcely realize the amount in the material saved.

It has occurred to me that there is a possible use that I could put these buildings to, if the Department is willing to sell them and give title to about one acre of land upon and near which these buildings are situate.

I have purchased a dwelling in Sudbury, where I am intending to have my headquarters and expect to move my family there as soon as we are given possession of the property, which will be about the beginning of October, and we might use the cottage as a summer residence, provided it can be purchased at a reasonable figure, and that we can get someone to reside in the old school building and take care of the whole property. Or I might find someone interested enough to purchase.

As an investment, I am prepared to offer the Department \$1,500.00. for the two main buildings, the woodshed and smaller buildings immediately surrounding them; the conditions to include one full acre of land upon which the buildings are situate and immediately surrounding them.

The conditions will have to include the right to use the present road across the property leading directly to the town of Chapleau.

If your Department is interested in this offer I should be glad to have word from you immediately.

Rt. Reverend Sir:

As you are no doubt aware, the old property of the Chapleau Indian Boarding School - some 165 acres more or less - known as Lot No. 2, Con. 6, Township of Chapleau in the District of Sudbury West, was offered by Your Lordship to the Department, in 1911. The understanding was that the consideration would be \$77.50, which was paid to the Provincial Government by Your Lordship in 1910, when you acquired the property.

It was brought to the attention of the Deputy Superintendent General that this transfer was never completed, due entirely to an oversight, and before he left for British Columbia, on Monday, last, he directed that the Department make arrangements to acquire the property in question. I have today directed a communication to the Department of Justice, enclosing a Certificate of Title, which you gave to Mr. H. A. West, one time Indian Agent. I have requested that the agent, at Sudbury, of the Department of Justice search the title and prepare a conveyance from Your Lordship to His Majesty, as represented by the Superintendent General of Indian Affairs - the consideration to be \$77.50.

This action is being taken because of the advisability of having all the land held by the Chapleau Indian Boarding School under the control of the Department.

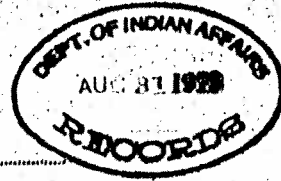


